The Quebec Local Government are at present rather hard pressed. For some days a brisk debate has been going on in connection with Crown Timber abuses, in which the Opposition has had the best of it.

The name of Mr. Justice K. Ramsay, of Montreal, is mentioned among the names of the candidates for Governorship of Manitoba.

The Nouveau Monde, having renounced allegiance to Cartier, is calling for a new chief to rule the land according to the precepts of the Catholic programme, and in obedience to the doctrines and imitations propounded by Father Braun.

Chancery Court. Before Chancellor Spragg. ROBERTSON vs. WATSON.—This is a bill filed to compel defendant to amend conveyance of certain lots purchased by plaintiff from defendant.

HEISSE vs. WAHN.—In this case, reported yesterday, the parties agreed to the terms of the decree, which may be briefly stated as follows: The defendant takes the Neustadt foundry, and dwelling therewith, at \$6,250, payable in promissory notes, which he holds against the late firm of Wahn & Heisse, for capital invested by defendant in excess of the plaintiff's share.

McISAAC vs. HENNEBERG.—Bill to declare that the trusts contained in a deed of a farm in Nichol made by the late Miss McIsaac, were void under the statutes of mortmain.

The Presbyterian Tercentenary. Since the memorable reunion of the Old and New School branches of the Presbyterian Church and their "memorial year" in 1870-'71, probably nothing has been of more historic interest in the denomination than the celebrations in this its tercentenary year.

Tariff Revision. The Montreal Board of Trade have issued a circular on Tariff Revision to the different boards of Trade in the country, as follows:

It is believed that any representation coming from such an intelligent body of commercial men, as the result of their united deliberations, would greatly assist Parliament in adopting such a policy as would be best adapted to the requirements of Canada.

The Toronto correspondent of the Hamilton Times says: "The arrangements respecting the new Agricultural Farm and College are rapidly progressing, the site having been chosen, though not yet announced. The cumbersome and expensive system adopted by the Sandfield Macdonald ministry will, in many of

its features, be abandoned; the course will probably consist of Agriculture, Natural History and Agriculture. The teaching of languages, except English, will not be adopted."
