A Minister Clears Out Under Suspicious Circumstances.

An Old Charge Hanging Over Him,

Some little talk has been occas Guelph and Elora within the past week respecting a Methodist minister, who gave his name as Charles Warren, who for the last two or three months had been acting as assistant in Elora, and who eached in the Methodiat Church, Guelph, a week ago last Sunday. Chief Constable Kelly has furnished us with some particulars, respecting this ministerial fraul, for fraud he evidently is, as the following facts will testify: Two years ago last June our Chief reesvied a circular from the office of the Chief of Police Milwankee, giving a photograph and discription of a Methodist minister named Charles W. Copeland, who was charged with forgery, and who had left that city for parts unknown. A reward was offered for his apprehension. Mr. Kelly kept a sharp look out for the clerical scamp, but never came across any one resembling him till a week ago last Sunday, when Charles Warren, alias Charles W. Copeland, entered the pulpit of the Wesleyan Church, Guelph. He was at once satisfied that the preacher was the man who was so badly wanted in May, 1871, in Milwankee. He kept his own council, however, till Monday morning, and as soon as the telegraph office was open sent a despatch to the Chief of Police in Milwankee, informing him of the facts and asking instructions, as he (Mr. Kelly) was aware that under the U.S. law a warrant only holds good for a certain time after being issued, and he was careful not to make any arrest without proper authority. He shortly after received an answer saying that Copeland was not wanted on the charge of fergery or on any other charge. In that case he of course could do nothing, but in a day or two after he informed the Rev. Mr. Howard of the circumstance. Warren happened to call on Mr. Howard some days after, when he was informed of Mr. Kelly's suspicions. He indignantly denied being the man, or knowing anything about the affair, but refused to go and see Mr. Kelly and satisfy that officer on the point.
