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Harriston Correspondence.

Spring has fairly set in at last. It was never looked for so anxiously before, especially by the farmers who had a large spring's work ahead of them. Up to this week scarcely anything could be done on the farm, the heavy frost at night "endering it impossible to de any ploughing. This has thrown farmers considerably behind, but they are now making good use of the time, and should the yeather keep favourable it will not be long before the work will be through. The heavy frost here damaged the fall wheat to a great extent. In many cases it will not be more than half a crop, while in others it will be a total failure; in fact, some of the farmens are already ploughing it up in order to sow other grain. Business is not bad, considering the season of the year.

There is some building going on. Alexander Irvine is building a residence on King street; Joseph Fisher is also erecting one on the same street. The work on the new W. M. Church has begun, and is being vigorously pushed.

The T., G. & B. R. Co. here completed their station and painted it, which gives the village an improved appearance.

The Council have decided to submit a by-law to the people to enable them to borrow the sum of \$1,000 to be applied to opening up Margaret street, from Elora street to the railway station, so as to give more easy access to it than there is at present, and make it more convenient for transhipment.

The merchants of Harriston have unanimously agreed to close their places of business at half-past seven, commencing on the first of May and to continue during the summer months, Saturday night excepted.

The show of cattle at the last fair was rather poor, as the farmers are so far behind with work that they had not time to attend; and as it will cost nothing to keep the cattle over till the next fair, three were few sales made.
