

THE DEATH ROLL

THOMAS L. CUTLER

After five weeks' illness from typhoid fever, death claimed Thomas L. Cutler at the Amasa Wood Hospital, St. Thomas, on Saturday night last. Deceased, who was in his 85th year, was born in Bayham, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Cutler, but for several years had been a fireman on the Michigan Central Railway. A widow and two daughters, Hazel and Violet, survive him.

GEORGE LAPHAM

In the death of George Lapham, which occurred at his residence, Water street, on Saturday, Aylmer loses a most desirable and worthy citizen. Deceased, who was only 58 years of age, removed to the 9th concession of Malahide, from Forest, some twenty-three years ago, and was one of the township's most successful farmers. In July of last year he retired from active work, and moved into his newly-built comfortable home on Water street. A few weeks ago he contracted a heavy cold, which developed into pneumonia, causing his death. Deceased was a consistent member of St. Paul's church, where he was also a member of the Quarterly Official Board. He is survived by his widow and two brothers, Frederick, of Royal Oak, Mich., and Keel, of Harriestville. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon to Aylmer cemetery.

DELLA ROBERTS

A very sudden death occurred in Malahide, just outside the corporation of Aylmer, on Sunday night, when Della, beloved wife of John Roberts, market gardener, succumbed to an attack of neuritis. On Saturday Mrs. Roberts was enjoying good health, did her work as usual and did not retire until a late hour that night. Her husband was awakened early Sunday morning by her frantic efforts to get her breath, and from then until 11 o'clock Sunday night when she passed away, it was a fight for breath. Besides her sorrowing husband she leaves three sons, Frank, age 18, Roy, 14, and Maurice, but 14 months old; also an aged father, Jacob Berdan, of Malahide, in his 90th year, four brothers, Alfonso Berdan, Mt. Salem; Albert, of Culloden; Ellis, of Pt. Huron; George, of Aylmer; and three sisters, Mrs. W. H. Green, Pt. Hope, Mich.; Mrs. W. Perry, Malahide; and Mrs. Lydia Chute, Aylmer. The funeral took place yesterday, and after service at the house interment was made in Luton cemetery.

On Saturday afternoon last, Polly Bishop Parker, relict of the late Jerome Parker, passed over to the silent majority, at the ripe old age of 86 years. Deceased was born at Romeo, Mich., and came to Aylmer with her husband nearly half a century ago, where she has since lived beloved and respected by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. She was of a retiring nature, but ever kind-hearted, generous and honorable.
