

An excellent gas well has been struck in the vicinity of Duart. Elizabeth Choate, an elderly lady who

resided alone in Ingersoll, was found dead in her kitchen. The death occurred at Neepawa, Man., recently of Mrs. F. B. Davidson, formerly of Glencoe.

Rev. J. Ross, of Chatham, has accepted the call to the Queen street Baptist church, St. Catharines. Machines

Samuel J. Walker, a well-known resident of Glencoe, died Tuesday after a lingering illness, aged 65 years.

Tenders are being asked for the purchase of the Brantford Co-Operative Packing Co's plant and buildings at Brantford.

The Pacific Express Co, has offered a reward of \$2,000 for the recovery of the bar of gold stolen from the Union depot in Detroit.

During the thunder storm on Thursday the barn of John Stuart, near Bothwell, was struck by lightning and destroyed; loss \$1,800.

The Glencoe council has entered into a new contract with W. W. Gordon for street lighting at \$468 a year, a reduction of \$144 on his former coutract.

REV. DR. ROSE DISCARDS GOWN

While Reading the Report of the Court of Appeal of the Methodist Church.

Ottawa, April 5—The Rev. Dr. Rose of the Dominion Methodist Church in a dramatic manner this morning discarded his gown that has been a source of discontent throughout the Methodist Church, not only here, but in all Canada. After the first hymn he paused in the services and read a declaration covering three pages of typewritthe services and read a declaration covering three pages of typewritten copy, stating his case. He showed considerable annoyance, and is apparently of the opinion still that he should be allowed to use the gown. He recited the fact of the first introduction of the gown, saying that he knew of no law forbidding it. The legality of its wearing was referred to the Court of Appeal of the general conference. The decision of the court was that it was prohibited by "general usage."

One passage of the statement

One passage of the statement reads: "In view of this decision of the Court of Appeal, no course is possible save to lay aside the gown, which I now do."

At that point Rev. Dr. Rose threw back his hands and dropped his gown to the floor beneath his

his gown to the floor beneath his feet.

In his statement he defended his action by saying: "I do this in your presence in respectful and loyal submission to the law of the church as interpreted by its highest court of interpretation. That is the only reason I shall no longer wear it in this pulpit. The decision of the court was not wholly unanimous. My private opinions are my own property, and are in no wise affected by the courts. Legal decisions forbid my using this decent pulpit robe, but they do not lessen admiration for it, nor dispel the hope that the day may come when liberty will be granted to our ministers to wear it. I cannot conceal my regret at this decision. It seems to limit unduly the liberty of the individual congregation in things indifferent. It discourages what I regard as a ritual doctrine.

"But I have hopes that Methodism will not only recognize the desirability of granting a fuller measure of liberty to individual congregations in mere matters of preference, but will also come more clearly to see that her life and progress depend upon a proper provision in her service and teaching and practices for every complexity of life consistent with Christian development. I trust the future to work its own reforms."

The gown was initiated by the Women's Aid of the Dominion Church last Christmas when the women subscribed \$2 apiece and presented Re.v Dr. Rose with a gown. He wore it and dissension arose. He now discards it.
