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

Mrs. Lawrence Lawrason Dead, Mrs. A. Lawrason, widow of the late Lawrence Lawrason, P.M., died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Ridout, 474 Princess avenue, on Saturday, at the age of 89 years. Mrs. Lawrason was the daughter of Dr. Wm. Hooker Lee, a United Empire Loyalist, and was born in the State of Connecticut on March 12, 1805. Dr. Chippewa with his father, where he practiced his profession. Later Dr. Lee removed o Southwold, Elgin county, where he die en March 30, 1829. Mrs. Lawrason removed to London about three years after her father's death, and was married to her late husband, first taking up their residence near the Forks, At that time the present site of London was occupied by only three or four families, better known among whom were the Goodhues, the Harrises and the Lawrasons. Since that time the deceased was a continuous resident. She had undergone the many trials to which the pioneers were subjected, and saw the little hamlet grow in size and population. The advancement of the place was ever the great object in Mr. and Mrs. Lawrason's life, and through their efforts the city rapidly grew. The outcome of the marriage was three children-Mrs. Ridout, 474 Princess avenue, Mrs. E. Baynes Reid, Queen's avenue, and Wm. Lawrason, who died in Muskoka. Mr. Lawrason died in 1881. Mrs. Lawrason was an active worker in St. Paul's Cathedral. She was one of the principal contributors to the cost of erecting the little frame building which was first used as a place of worship by the Anglicans of London. The structure was destroyed by fire, and Mr. and Mrs. Lawreson were among the first to move for the erection of a new building. The funeral will leave Mrs. Ridout's residence this ofternoon at 2:30. Services will be held in St. Paul's Cathedral at 3.

"Wanted in Heaven." The Y. M. C. A. inaugurated their fal campaign yesterday afternoon by the first of a series of meetings to men only held in eloquent Black Knight who has charmed London audiences before. Under the able leadership of Mr. Fred. L. Evans the orchestra rendered selections of sacred music for half an hour before the meeting opened. The vice-president, Mr. W. M. Spencer, presided, and called on the Rev. W. Rigsby to conduct the devotional exercises. The Rev. J. H. Hector, popularly known as "The Black Knight" is one of the most remarkable men of the present day. His life story surpasses any romance in its startling realities. Left an orphan at an early age, he passed a youth of vicissitude, hardship and privation such as few have experienced. Later on he fought in some of the fiercest struggles of the great American civil war, and was five times fearfully wounded, so that his survival was almost miraculous. Subsequently, as an engine driver, he had many a perilous experience, but he came through all to be a converted man, an earnest Christian, a successful minister of the Gospel, and one of the most effective advocates of prohibition and Mr. Hector is other moral reforms. a full-blooded negro of superb physique and great natural ability, to which, despite all difficulties, he has added a self-education which must compel admiration. As an orator he is a phenomenon, carrying his audience along with him by a tornado of elequence, humor and pathos that is irresistible. Yesterday he took for his subject "Wanted in Heaven," speaking from Luke, xix., 10: "For the Son of Man is come to seek and to save that which was lost. Speaking on Gospel lines, he pleaded in elequent language with the unconverted in the audience to accept the Lord Jesus Christ. As he pleaded in elequent and pathetic language, illustrating his points with incidents in his early life, many of his hearers were deeply moved.
