LONDON AND ENVIRONS

—A private party, numbering about 70,

went to Wonderland last night and spent

the evening in dancing.

—Mr. Chas. Pavey, who has been in the

city attending the funeral of his brother,
Walter, has returned to Salt Lake City.

—Wm. Stewart, of this city, a United

States customs officer, was chairman of the
Democratic county committee at Port
Huron on Tuesday.

—Mr. J. H. McConnell, who spoke for

Mr. Meredith last night in Westminster
Park, is the grand organizer of the P. P. A.
and introduced the society into Canada
at Windsor from the United States.

—Mr. J. W. Jones yesterday offered at

auction the two frame cottages and lots,
Nos. 728 and 732 York street. The former
was purchased by Mr. George Clark for
\$1,200. No. 732 was withdrawn at \$1,300.

—The amount collected at the band

concert on Tuesday night was \$146.28.
This is considered very gratifying, and
makes the aggregate donations to the
Fraser River sufferers from London nearly
\$1,000.

—One of the beds for the machinery at

Springbank was cast at the London Ma-
chine Tool Company's works on Tuesday
morning. It is supposed to be the biggest
casting ever turned out in this city, and
weighs over ten tons.

—Rev. Walter Rigby, the new pastor of

Colborne Street Methodist Church, is the
youngest man elected representative to the
General Conference in this city. The other
ministerial members for this city are Revs.
J. R. Gundy, J. W. Annis and Dr. Antiff.—An excellent programme has been pre-
pared for the free sacred concert at the
First Presbyterian Church to-night. Mr.
W. C. Barron is the director and will be
assisted by the choir. Miss Moore, teacher
of singing at Hellmuth College, and Miss
Lilywhite, both clever artists, will take the
solo parts.

—The jury in the case of the death of

the infant child of Mr. S. M. Jepson ren-
dered a verdict last evening of death by
drowning, with the assurance that the
unfortunate mother was wholly irrespon-
sible for the act. The afflicted family and
relatives have the deepest sympathy of all
in this doubly sad affliction.

—Rev. D. Spencer, of St. Thomas, has

issued a circular to free-will, old school,
disciple and regular Baptists who are
interested in Baptist union, requesting
them to attend a meeting for prayer and
conference in Center Street Baptist Church,
St. Thomas, on Thursday, June 21, at 1:30
p.m. Ministers, deacons and members are
invited.

—One of the men on the platform of the

South London meeting to promote the candi-
dature of the Toronto city solicitor, less than
a week ago, posed as an absolutely "no
party man" in support of Mr. Shore in Lon-
don West. What a difference crossing the
river makes! The electors see through all
this doubling and twisting. It would not
be necessary if Sir Oliver could be success-
fully assailed.

—The leaders of circles of King's

Daughters and Sons of the city held a
special meeting on June 13 to discuss the
matter of sending aid to the sufferers in the
flood district of British Columbia. It was
resolved that each circle should lay the
matter before its members. Some circles
handed in donations on the spot. Much
sympathy was expressed, and all appeared
anxious to aid in relieving the great need.
All contributions are to be sent to the city
treasurer of the order, subject to the dis-
posal of the chairman, Mrs. E. M. Tilley.—St. Thomas Journal: A special meet-
ing of the city council will be held to con-
sider the request of Superintendent Mor-
ford, of the M. C. R., that Mr. Ingram be
instructed to oppose the bill for the lease of
the L. and P. S. R. to the L. E. and D. R.
R. now before the railway committee. The
clause objected to is one prohibiting the
M. C. R. from carrying "local" freight
between London and St. Thomas. If the
lease is ratified in its present shape, it is
said that it will result in the M. C. R. dis-
continuing running on the L. and P. S. R.Copies of the green sheet, "The Eye-
Opener" were stealthily distributed in the
city last night. The men who were em-
ployed were careful to conceal their
identity. They know that the statements
contained in the sheet are either entirely
false or gross misrepresentations of facts,
and they seemed to be ashamed of their
work. The sheet is an anti-Mowat docu-
ment, and its aim is to foment bigotry on
one hand and insult the Catholic com-
munity on the other, all with the object of
helping the candidature of Mr. Meredith.—When Mr. Peddle ran against him, Mr.
Meredith objected to him as a non-resident
because he lived in London West. London
West is only a few yards removed from
London city. Mr. Meredith has been for
six years a resident of Toronto. He is nearly
120 miles removed from London. Mr. Peddle
was a worker in the London furniture fac-
tory. Mr. Meredith is the paid agent of
Toronto. If it was right to defeat Mr.
Peddle, the London workman, in 1886, on
Mr. Meredith's demand, is it right to elect
Mr. Meredith, the Toronto lawyer, in 1894,
when his opponent is a merchant manu-
facturer devoted to the interests of this city?

—The late Milton Campbell, who was

fatally injured at St. Thomas on Tuesday
night on the L. and P. S. R. track, was
employed as messenger on the M. C. R.,
and at the time of the accident was taking
correspondent's copy of the proceedings of
the London Conference to the L. E. and D.
R. train, to be taken by it to London for

THE OPEN FORUM.

London and the Floods in British

Columbia.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

When in Ottawa the other day I heard

that London was coming forward to assist
the sufferers by the floods in BritishColumbia. I am glad of that. There are
a number of people from your city and
county now living in our Province, and
they will be proud to hear that their oldfriends in Middlesex are not forgetful of
them. I have no doubt that there are people
from London and Middlesex among the
sufferers. But outside of these considera-
tions the relief of the stricken people
of the Fraser River valley is in
itself an object worthy of your
sympathy and aid. It is one which should
appeal to every Canadian heart throughout
the length and breadth of the Dominion.I have no doubt that Canada as a whole
through its Government and through pri-
vate contributions will act nobly in this
our time of distress, but it is pleasing to a
British Columbian to note the efforts which
your city is so promptly putting forward
for the relief of the distressed settlers. I
can assure you the helping hand extended
now will not soon be forgotten by the peo-
ple of the Pacific Province.I need not touch upon the scene of deso-
lation that exists along the Fraser River, as
it has been but too truly depicted already
in the columns of the newspapers, but im-
agine for one moment if every farm in the
county of Middlesex were destroyed at one
fell swoop of the elements, if the farm
houses, barns, fences, cattle and crops
were swept away in a day; if the farmers
and their families were left without
clothing, food or shelter, and destruction
and desolation seen on every side. Im-
agine such a picture, and you
have before you the valley of
the Fraser—a valley of death—
strong men, delicate women and tender
babes have all had to suffer alike, are still
suffering, and are likely to feel the pinch
of poverty and want for days to come.I don't believe the Canadian people will
stand by without extending the hand of aid
and sympathy to the settlers of British
Columbia in their distress, and the move-
ments in London and other places already
made for the purpose of rendering assist-
ance to the sufferers is a happy omen of
what is yet to come from all parts of Can-
ada in the shape of relief.The more quickly the helping hand is
extended to the distressed, the better it will be,
for now is the time when aid will be of most
service to the settlers.In the Province everything is being done
by the authorities, by individuals and cor-
porations to rescue and help the settlers,
but the task, I fear, is greater than local
efforts can cope with. I hope then that
the movement to help British Columbia in
her present distress will become universal
