Immigration and Loan Corporation Bills Reported.

Legislative Chamber, Toronto, March 24.-Yesterday was a good one for public business in the Legislature. Much work and little talking resulted in putting through the committee stage two important Government measures promoted by the Commissioner of Crown Lands-the bill to regulate the immigration into Ontario of certain classes of children, and the bill respecting loan companies.

Two bills were introduced, one by Mr. Currie, the Patron member for West Simcoe, and the other by Hon.

Mr. Currie introduced his bill to beter secure the independence of the Legislative Assembly. This is the bill introduced last session. It provides that no member of the Legislature shall be appointed to any office under the Government, or for a year after ceasing to be a member.

Mr. Gibson proposes to amend the

act respecting land surveyors and the survey of lands. The bill changes the qualification of apprentices and the term to be served. It admits surveyors from other places in the British doninions, and provides that candidates shall pass examinations in elementary botany, as well as in the subjects now required. It amends the act in other

respects.
Several important bills were considered in committee, but the only one that occasioned much discussion was Mr. Gibson's bill with respect to loan companies. Since drafting it he had received some useful suggestions which he proposed as amendments or addi-tions to the bill. 


