EGG AND POULTRY TRADE. Washington, D.C., May 3 .- The state department has been furnished some interesting facts and figures concerning the importation of eggs and poultry into Great Britain by Consul Mar-shall Halstead, at Birmingham, England. The importation of eggs last year was valued at \$24,548,227, while the poultry and game figures were \$3,821,-There is a growing demand for turkeys in Great Britain, and of late years importations from abroad have increased enormously. France and Denmark control the bulk of the egg trade with Great Britain, while most of the foreign poultry comes from Italy and France, though Canada of late has made a strong bid to establish a poultry trade with England.



General Hamley tells of sentries who, on being re-lieved, yet stood stock still, immovable, speechless, and staring into vacancy. In some cases, after the man had been removed this sort of fixity would remain for hours.

Even in peace time, there was a case lately where a young sentry wounded the guard by firing at it under the belief that he saw a ghost; and Lord Roberts, in one of his magazine articles, relates that even the most reliable and truthful soldiers on sentry often have the most fantastic stories to tell, due to shattered nerves. Great numbers of soldiers in war time have committed suicide or accidentally shot themselves, the cause often being that they imagined they had let some one creep past them, and had thus be-trayed their trust.—London Answers.
