KILL IMBECILES!

Denver Doctor's Startling Proposal Made
at Medical Association Meeting.

Denver, Col., June 19.—The Colorado
State Medical Association disappointed
a large audience today by passing
over the paper which Dr. Denison, a
Denver physician, was to have read,
in which he was to argue for the ex-
termination of imbecile children. Dr.
Denison's suggestion, which has
aroused great indignation, is that on
the application of the parents, im-
becile children be painlessly put to
death. Humanity in general would
be benefited, he says.
The delegates passed over the paper
today because they wanted to think
the matter over before discussing it.
If the suggestion is adopted a petition
will be presented to the legislature.
It is predicted that it will be killed
there. The delegates are about even-
ly divided.

CAPE REBELS SENTENCED!

Treason Court Sends Commandant Stry-
dom to Prison for Two Years.

Six Thousand Cape Burghers Join the Boer Forces--
Foreigners in the Ranks of the Enemy.

Cape Town, June 21.—The Treason
Court, which is sitting at Burghers-
dorp, has sentenced Commandant
Strydom to two years' imprisonment
at hard labor. He led a commando in
the battle at Stormberg in the early
part of the war, and was an exceed-
ingly active Cape rebel. Acting Vice-
Commandant Kotze, another Cape re-
bel, was fined £250.

REBELLION SPREADS.

London, Friday, June 21.—The pro-
Boer Daily News says it hears that
the rebellion is spreading ominously
in Cape Colony. It says that it is
stated that about 6,000 inhabitants of
the Cape Colony, mostly farmers' sons,
have joined the Boer commandos.

FOREIGNERS IN BOER FORCES.

Washington, June 20.—Capt. Carl
Reichmann's report on the operations
of the British and Boer forces in the
war in South Africa is to be published
by the war department. Capt.
Reichmann praises the Boer's charac-
ter, his fighting qualities and daring,
but criticizes the absence of soldier
qualifications. He declares that for-
eigners were the aggressive feature
of the Boer army.

CANADIANS RETURNING.

Montreal, June 20.—A Star cable
from London says: The following
Canadian scouts left the Cape for
England by the steamship Roslin
Castle, on the 16th inst.—Lieuts. Ryan,
Thompson and Callaghan; Surgeon
Ross and 75 men. They are due at
Southampton on July 4. Surgeon Mc-
Donald, of the Canadian scouts also
left Cape Town for England on the
steamship Roslin Castle.

OOM PAUL COMING.

New York, June 21.—According to a
special from Washington, Boer sym-
bolizers in the United States are
making preparations for a visit by
Kruiger to this country in the autumn.

THE SMALLPOX

Prevails in 82 Places in Michigan—Four
New Cases at Beachville, Ont., and One
More at Hamilton.

Lansing, Mich., June 21.—Smallpox is
now present in 82 places in Michigan, or
seven more than last week.
Woodstock, Ont., June 20.—Four new
cases of smallpox have developed in
Beachville, but they are under one roof.
The father and the children of the An-
drew Todd family are down with it. Mrs.
Todd so far has not contracted the dis-
ease. Every precaution is being taken
and the quarantine is rigidly enforced.

FRED RICE SENT FOR TRIAL.

Toronto, June 21.—Fred Lee Rice
was yesterday committed for trial at
the next assizes on the charge of mur-
dering County Constable William
Boyd, on June 5. No evidence was
submitted towards clearing up the
mystery as to who threw the revolver
which the burglar used in the cab.
The medical evidence shattered the
defense theory that the shooting might
have been done by Stewart, the other
constable, during the fight. Dr. Caven-
swort that the bullet taken from
Boyd's head was one from the re-
volvers thrown into the cab, one of
which was in Rice's hand when he
was arrested.

SUPPOSED INFANTICIDE.

Windsor, Ont., June 21.—On Tues-
day, June 11, a child was born to Lucy
Nolan, 16 years of age, of Cape
Croker, Indian reserve, which was
celebrated Saturday last, when the
mother told where she had buried it.
No one was present at the infant's
birth. A post-mortem made by Dr.
Hough, of Windsor, showed that the
child had been born alive, and was
normally developed, and that death
was due to a cut across the throat,
severing the windpipe and gullet.
The mother made no statement, and
is at present in a serious condition of
health. She was placed under arrest
by the coroner, the coroner's jury find-
ing that death was due to the wound.

WARNING OF LORD BERESFORD

Britain should Have Stronger
Mediterranean Fleet.

Split in the Liberal Ranks on the
Boer Question.

Herbert Asquith Hailed as the True
Leader of the Party—Inspection of
Submarine Torpedo Boat
Destroyer.

LORD BERESFORD'S WARNING.
London, June 21.—The Daily Mail
publishes a letter from Rear Admiral
Lord Charles Beresford to a correspon-
dent, complaining of the want of
proper strength and efficiency in Great
Britain's Mediterranean fleet. In this
letter Lord Charles says his duty as
second in command of the fleet pre-
vents his giving his reasons publicly.
He further says that he has commu-
nicated his views on the subject to the
proper authorities in as strong and clear
Anglo-Saxon language as he can com-
mand.

THE LIBERAL SPLIT.

Herbert Asquith, former liberal
home secretary, speaking at a Liberal
dinner last evening, protested against
the pro-Boer resolutions adopted at
Queen's Hall, yesterday evening, being
accepted as a pronouncement of the
Liberal party. He declared that Boer
independence was impossible, and said
the Liberals favored a free federated
South Africa, on the lines of Canada
and Australia.

Mr. Asquith further said that Lib-
erals holding his views had been
branded as schismatics, but they had
not changed their views, had always
declared with equal explicitness whether
they considered it must now be left for
the judgment of history.

Mr. Asquith said that at the begin-
ning of the war he believed it possible
to restore the status of the two Afri-
can Republics, but that he was now a
reluctant convert to the necessity of
annexation.

SPLIT THE PARTY.

By his trenchant speech Mr. Asquith
achieved the complete severance of the
two wings
