In this etter Lord Charles says his duty as second in command of the fleet prevents his giving his reasons publicly. He further says that he has communicated his views on the subject to the proper authorities in as strong and elear Anglo-Saxon language as he can

THE LIBERAL SPLIT.

Herbert Asquith, former Liberal nome secretary, speaking at a Liberal dinner last evening, protested against the pro-Boer resolutions adopted at Queen's Hall, yesterday evening, being accepted as a pronouncement of the Liberal party. He declared that Boer independence was impossible, and said the Liberals favored a free federated South Africa, on the lines of Canada and Australia.

Mr. Asquith further said that Liberals holding his views had been branded as schismatics, but they had not changed their views, had always condemned the war policy, and that they considered it must now be left for the judgment of history.

Mr. Asquith said that at the beginning of the war he believed it possible to restore the status of the two African Republics, but that he was now a reluctant convert to the necessity of annexation
