DATE FOR HAMILTON MEET.

Samuel Barker retired from the presidency owing to the stress of other business. The following officers were elected: William Hendrie, Jun., president; F. C. Bruce, first vice-president; Dr. A. B. Osborne, second vice-president. The other directors are J. M. Harry, E. B. Barker, P. D. Creer, R. S. Morris, Judge Monck and Major J. S. Hendrie. A meeting of the directors will be held shortly to arrange for the spring meeting.

PLAYERS AWARDED.
New York, Nov. 20.—John H. Announcement is also made of a ruling, which prohibits minor league players from minor league clubs and afterwards being drafted by a major league club from playing with the latter until the money has been refunded.
