The bedstead used for many years by
Queen Marie Antoinette is still preserved
exactly as she left it at the Grand
Triumph. Judged by many modern de-
signs, neither the furniture nor the set-
tings are particularly royal in appear-
ance. The bed is inlaid, having been
built after the designs of a great artist
of the court. It is considered priceless,
both because of its artistic and historic
value.

Among the most picturesque of trades-
people in the east are the turbaned mer-
chants of Egypt. Scores of these quaint
old characters are to be found in Cairo.
The stock of a single merchant is of
quantity of great value, yet he is content
to display as much the same as an Italian
in an American city displays his fruit.
The stones are laid out in little piles and
parcels on a little stand, which may be
carried from place to place.
All new schools in Switzerland have
a portion of the ground floor appropri-
ated for baths. Each class bathes once a
fortnight, summer and winter. Soap is
used and a warm bath is followed by a
cooler one. Sick children and those hav-
ing skin diseases are excluded.
France has 164,550 saloons to supply the
wants of 36,000,000 inhabitants. That is,
one saloon to 220 inhabitants, and this
number is constantly increasing. During
the last ten years the consumption of
alcohol in France has increased in alarm-
ing proportions, while England and the
United States have progressed toward
temperance.

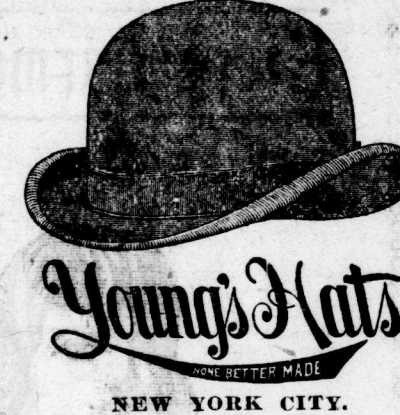

DISEASES IN LONDON.

The February bulletin, just published
by the provincial board of health,
shows that diseases existed in the four
principal cities of the Province during
that month, as follows: Scarlatina—
London, 18 cases, no deaths; Ottawa, 10
cases, no deaths; Hamilton, 28 cases, 1
death; Toronto, 41 cases, no deaths.
Diphtheria—London, 25 cases, 4 deaths;
Ottawa, 6 cases, 1 death; Hamilton, 11
cases, 1 death; Toronto, 12 cases, 11
deaths. Typhoid—London, 1 death; Ham-
ilton, 1 death; Toronto, 5 cases, 3
deaths. Tuberculosis—London, 5 deaths;
Ottawa, 7 deaths; Hamilton, 6 deaths;
Toronto, 25 deaths.

LADY MACCABEES AT HOME.

A Famous Strait.

The Strait of Dardanelles, of which
so much is now heard in connection
with the British fleet, is a
famous stretch of water. At its nar-
rowest part, which is only three-quar-
ters of a mile wide, once stood the ce-
lebrated Dardanelles. Dardanelles
whence the strait derives its name. It
was at this point that Leander used
to swim across to visit his loved Hero.
The strait was then known as the Hel-
lespont, and it was there also that
Xerxes and his army passed into Euro-
pe over the bridge of boats in 480 B.
C. In modern times the name Darda-
nelles has acquired an interest to Can-
adians owing to its identification with
the popular Dardanelles Turkish cit-
adels, sold everywhere at 15 cents
per package, with cork, silver or plain
tips.

NO REDUCTION IN LONDON

Price of Coal Will Continue Here
at \$7 a Ton For Some Time

Slight Drop at Hamilton—May Re-
main Up Here All Summer.

According to the Hamilton papers
the coal men of that city have cut the
price of hard coal 25 cents a ton,
anthracite now retailing there at \$6.50
per ton. Asked if there was any
chance of a similar cut in this city,
a local coal dealer answered in the
negative.

"Six dollars and a half a ton in
Hamilton is no better than \$7 a ton
in London, the price we are now ask-
ing," said the coal man. "The dif-
ference in freight rates is about 60
cents a ton, as between Hamilton and
London, from Buffalo. The difference
goes to the railroads, not to the
dealer."

The dealer also stated that there
was no surplus of coal this spring,
and it was not always possible to
have orders delivered when they were
wanted. Navigation is late in open-
ing, and as a consequence the rail-
roads are very busy, and have more
than they can do, especially across the
line. Of course there is no scarcity
of coal, but the dealer does not look
for a reduction in price for some time
yet, if indeed there is a reduction this
summer.

THE QUAKERS ARE COMING

Band of Them Will Invade On-
tario This Summer.

Among Other Places Meetings Are
To Be Held in London.

London will be visited by a band of
Quakers some time in May or early in
June. The followers of George Fox
think that much good can be done by
stirring the heathens of the faith before
the people, and they will hold services
throughout the country this summer.
James Corson, of Quakertown, Berks
County, Pennsylvania, was in Toronto
yesterday and was asked why he chose
Canada for the work.

"This is a good country," was the
reply, "thy people are great church-
goers, thy cities are moral and well-
living, thy judges are upright, thy men
seem better educated than the Ameri-
cans, there are no baseball games or
prize fights on Sundays. I have been
treated with respect in Canada. If I
ask a question of a stranger or a po-
liceman, I am answered without deri-
sion and treated courteously. In the
States it is different. In Buffalo I was
subjected to the 'guying' of small boys
on the street corner and other dis-
courtesies. I honestly believe that
there are more Christians in Canada
in proportion to the population than
in the United States."

"I am going to Buffalo tomorrow,
and then back to Pennsylvania, where
I will lay the result of my mission to
Canada before the brothers. Toronto
will probably be the place where we
will open our services. About twelve
of us will come here on May 5, and
these will be followed by the sisters
and the remainder of the brothers with
the tabernacle. This is a large tent
50 to 60 feet, with a large rostrum.
There will be one hundred of us alto-
gether. Our services in Toronto will
begin about May 15. We will after-
wards go to London, St. Thomas, Ham-
ilton, Montreal and Kingston, the tour
lasting about six weeks."
