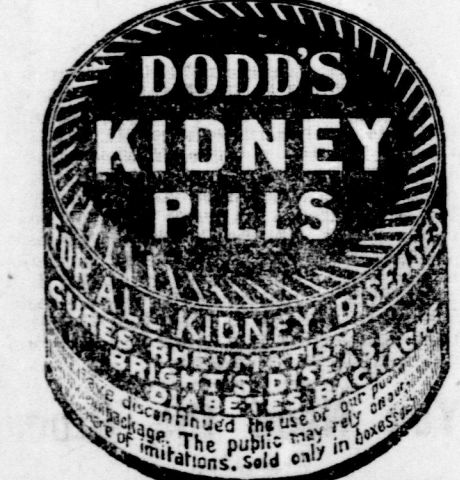

Clay Eclipse was one of the most valued horses of the establishment founded by Randolph Huntington, and now owned by Walter Russell and R. V. C. Sewell. A big price was offered by an agent of the Russian Government stud for the Fleetwood farm Arab stallions, Clay Eclipse being included in the list.

**EARL GREY CANNOT
COME THIS SPRING**

Governor-General Finds it Impossible to Open the Nurses' Home.

Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, will not visit London this spring. This is official. The notification came to Supt. Heard, of Victoria Hospital, London, and the superintendent was in session at the hospital, making arrangements for the reception of the distinguished guest, and also for the opening of the Nurses' Home. The communication proved a very bitter disappointment to the trust, and it was feared that there should be no formal opening of the home until the last of this month, when the nurses' graduating exercises will be held. Then it is probable that an official ceremony will be held.

Colonel Hanbury-Williams, secretary to his excellency, intimates that Earl Grey finds it possible to visit London later on, he will notify the trust.

**VOTE WAS TAKEN
THEN ADJOURNED**

Birkbeck Shareholders Could Not Agree on Appointment of a Trust Company.

The shareholders of the Birkbeck Loan Company met in the Masonic Temple yesterday and voted on the question of appointing a trust company to wind up the affairs of the institution. The result of the vote will not be known until Friday, May 26, when another meeting will be held at 2:30 p.m.

The names of two trust companies were before the shareholders as liquidators of the London and Western Trust Company of this city, and the Canada Trust Company.

Mr. Henry Vincent, president of the meeting, and he named Messrs. R. J. Shillington, of this city, and J. A. Moody, of St. Thomas, as scrutineers to take up the names of those called for nominations for liquidator.

and Mrs. Platt, Messrs. Taylor and Meredith noted that the London and Western Trusts Company be named as the liquidator.

On behalf of Messrs. W. H. Shaver and Eugene Coote, Messrs. C. H. Ivey and J. M. Dromgole moved that the liquidator be the Canada Trust Company.

Mr. Ivey backed up his motion by protesting against the two scrutineers named by the president, one of whom, he said, was in the employ of the men who wished to have him appointed. The president had no right to name the scrutineers in such a manner, he contended. It was not fair to the shareholders. He asked that a committee be named to say who had and who had not the right to vote.

Messrs. Luscombe and Gibbons defended the action of the president in naming the scrutineers.

Mr. Ivey was then invited to name a third scrutineer, but he refused. "We won't play with loaded dice," he said.

The vote was taken by the scrutineers named by the president, and an adjournment was made until the 26th. It is understood that if it is found that the London and Western Trusts Company has been voted as the liquidator, Mr. Ivey, on behalf of the shareholders, he expressed his willingness to carry the matter into the courts.

It was in order that he might be free to act as he thought best in this matter that he refused to make his clients a party to the vote which was really taken under protest.

**WOULD NOT PLACE
RESPONSIBILITY**

The manner in which John W. Nuttall met his death was investigated last night at the police station by a jury presided over by Coroner (Dr.) Ferguson. After the evidence of the doctors who performed the autopsy and that of Contractor Ed Martyn was taken, the jury brought in the following verdict:

"We believe that John William Nuttall came to his death on Friday, the 12th inst., while laboring at the Bank of Commerce, being caused by the fall of a quantity of bricks and mortar on his body, resulting in sudden death by dislocation of the neck. We do not feel warranted from the evidence in placing the responsibility for the accident upon anyone."

Dr. J. J. Hogg, who performed the autopsy, described the injuries which they found the deceased had sustained.

The evidence of Contractor Ed Martyn was taken, although he was not an actual eye-witness of the accident. He stated that Nuttall had been previously warned to be careful at his work. At the time of the accident Nuttall was at work carrying away bricks from the vault on the second story.

Two or three courses of bricks above him gave away from the back of the vault.

The evidence of Robert Nuttall, John Banks, of Victoria, John Leases and George Turner, corroborated the evidence of the contractor.

Half an hour sufficed for the jury to consider the evidence and bring in a verdict.

Mr. A. Greenlees was present in the interests of Nuttall's relatives, while Mr. Campbell, of Pauls & Campbell, appeared for William Rogers, who was working near Nuttall when the accident happened. Since the accident Rogers has been unable to leave his home, because his left leg was partially paralyzed by being struck by a quantity of bricks. Consequently, two actions for damages will be entered against Contractor Martyn instead of one. Mr. T. H. Luscombe appeared for Mr. Martyn.

GAS OWNS PHILADELPHIA
Council Called Thieves by Citizens for Selling Out Vote.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 18.—Amid scenes of disorder unprecedented in the annals of Philadelphia's legislative body, the city council tonight voted to lease the city's gas works to the United Gas Improvement Company for a term of 75 years for the total sum of \$25,000,000; the money to be paid in various amounts before the end of 1910.

Councils, chambers and committee rooms were crowded with excited citizens protesting against the lease from 1 p.m. until the proceedings opened, after three hours' debate.

The climax was reached when the vote in common council was announced after three hours' debate. The moment President McCurdy, of common council, announced the vote, a great uproar was started in the gallery which was crowded to the doors. From all over the gallery came hisses and cries of "Thieves."

The outburst was somewhat startling to the presiding officer, who made a vain effort to quell it. Finally, he sent for a squad of police officers to clear the gallery, which started the disorder anew.

The crowd continued to hiss and called the councilmen thieves and other names until the police arrived and started to clear the gallery. As the people moved out they sang uncomplimentary songs.

In clearing the gallery there were several clashes between the police and some of the spectators, but no one was hurt. All through the session of common council there were disorders. There was neither a cheer nor a hiss when the bill passed the select council.

The agitation against the passage of the bill resulted in the common council annulling the measure so as to provide for a slight reduction in the price of gas from \$1 a thousand cubic feet in 1911 to 30 cents in 1980.
