1.-Rub well every night with cold cream or cocoa butter, and wear glove fingers to protect the cracks. Wear housemaid's gloves while doing your work, and be sure to dry your hands white, or in one of these two shades. thoroughly after washing, especially before going into the open air.

Cook all together until the apples are thoroughly soft. When cold pack into a stone jar and keep covered.

3.—Avoid extremes of temperature as much as possible. Rub at nights with alcohol. Get some carbolic salve from a druggist and apply nightly, or as frequently as possible.

4.—Everything depends upon the space you have for the box, and the use you desire to put it to. If it is to serve the purpose of a dressing table, a box the size of the average bureau is best; for a chiffonier, a box about 4 feet high and 11/2 feet wide, is most suitable, or for a seat, 3 feet by 1½ by 2, are about the proper measurements. HELD FOR MURDER Police Think He Shot Aged

Pastor and His Wife.

[Associated Press.]

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 25.—A jury empanelled by Coroner Bower, of Mercer County, today viewed the bodies the Rev. Amzi L. Armstrong and his wife, who were murdered at their home in Dutch Neck Wednesday night. The fury also made a thorough inspection of the house in which the aged couple were killed. The coroner fixed Dec. 8 as the day for taking testimony.

John Sears, son of the negro housekeeper employed by the Armstrongs, and who lived with his mother at the Armstrong homestead, slept well last night in the county jail, where he was taken last evening charged with the double murder. Sears is of a surly temperament, and does not have much to say. He is a half-breed negro, and has lived with his mother at the Arm. strong home since he was an infant.
An autopsy disclosed the fact that the aged couple had been killed by a shotgun. After the murder a shot-gun, which Sears had borrowed from
