

REV. A. J. M'GILLIVRAY CALLED TO GUELPH

The Former Pastor of New St. James' Church Will Likely Accept.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Guelph, March 6.—At a well-attended meeting of the congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church, held last night, a unanimous call was extended to Rev. Dr. A. J. MacGillivray, of Toronto, to become its pastor, to succeed the late Rev. G. W. Arnold. Dr. MacGillivray has been supplying the pulpit of the church for some time past and has made a host of friends. His was the only name submitted. He was formerly pastor of a large church at Vancouver, B. C., and also of New St. James' Presbyterian Church, London.

YIELD OF FLAX FIBRE VERY DISAPPOINTING

Long Wet Spell Blamed For Serious Shortage in Zurich District.

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CAPTAIN TRAUCHE BURIED AT GODERICH

Was One of Pioneer Traders With the Indians of the North.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Goderich, March 5.—The funeral of Capt. Francis Trauche, one of the pioneer captains of Lakes Huron and Superior, took place yesterday at St. Peter's Catholic Church. Capt. Trauche had retired from active sailing the last few years and had been living with his daughter in Detroit.

He was one of the earliest captains who was engaged in the shore trade of Lakes Huron and Georgian Bay, when Ontario was a primeval forest, and railroads were unknown, and nothing but a blazed trail through the woods existed between Hamilton and Goderich.

A great deal of his earliest trading was carried on with Indians of the Georgian Bay, and the north shore. In after years he was taken aboard the Government steamship Bayfield, making a survey of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay under the command of Commander Burton, as an authority on the contour of these lakes and bays, as it was familiarly said by old mariners "that he knew every boulder, stone, rock and reef in the upper lakes."

The captain has often related how Goderich harbor in early days was located when some miles out from port by a huge elm tree that grew at Smith's Hill, about five miles east of Goderich prior to the time when docks or piers existed, and the mouth of the Maitland River was the only available harbor. He was 80 years old and was master of a small rigged schooner at the age of 18. He was married twice and leaves one son and three daughters. The pall-bearers were members of the C. M. B. A.

APPLE PEELINGS SENT BY TONS TO HOLLAND

Will Be Used in the Manufacture of Wines, Extracts and Jelly.

Kincardine, March 6.—Mr. Begner shipped from his evaporator here recently 19,635 pounds of dried apple peelings and other refuse for Rotterdam, Holland. It seems somewhat strange to many that this refuse is bought as readily as apples, and people often wonder what is done with it.

The preparation from this dried refuse may come back here as flavoring extracts or fancy jellies, but it is commonly used for the higher class of wines and liquors.

REGISTERED CATTLE BROUGHT BIG PRICES

American Buyers Bought Up Large Quantities of Fine Animals.

Guelph, March 5.—The tenth annual auction sale of registered stock under the auspices of the Guelph Fat Stock Club and the Ontario Department of Agriculture, which took place in the Winter Fair building this afternoon, was one of the most successful sales ever held in Guelph. The attendance was exceptionally large, the class of animals offered for sale of a very high quality, and the bidding was very spirited. The prices obtained were far beyond all expectations, and were due principally to the presence of buyers from the United States and the Canadian west.

Messrs. Brown and McCullough, owners of a big cattle ranch at Great Falls, Montana, were the principal buyers. They were looking for some first-class breeding stock, and it speaks volumes for the Guelph sale that these people should come all the way from Montana in order that they might secure the best stock available for their ranch. Many comments were heard from farmers and breeders on the good stock leaving Canada and going to the United States, but as was pointed out by others, the remedy was in their own hands.

The largest contributors to the sale were W. C. Edwards & Co., of Rockland, Ont., who brought ten fine bulls to the sale, and it was these bulls which brought the highest price. The highest-priced animal sold was a two-year-old, called Clipper, Prince, \$4149, and the price paid for him was \$325, a record one for some years past. He was bought by G. R. Rankin & Son, of Hamiota, Manitoba. Sailor Joy, 88109, a red two-year-old bred by G. D. Fletcher, of Erin, brought \$240, and will go to Montana. Ramsden Groom, 8794, bred by G. & W. Parkinson, Guelph, was sold to Mr. Wilson, of Pergus, for \$200, and R. McAllister, of Auburn, bought Sir Wilfrid, 86789, from Peter Stewart, of Everton, for \$215.

The Montana ranch owners took away from Guelph sixteen as fine breeding animals as one would wish to see, and they will do much toward improving the cattle on their big ranch.

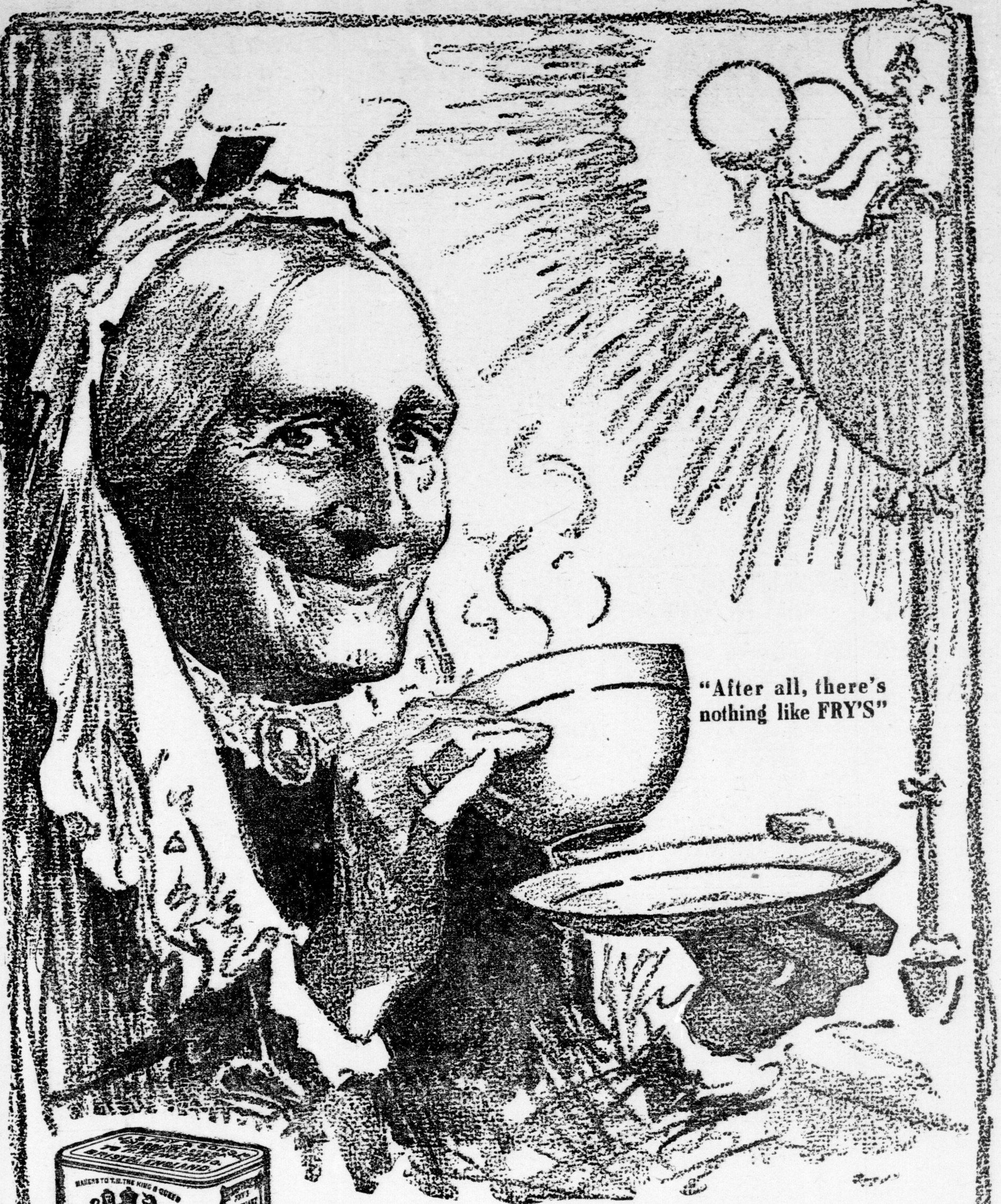
The average price paid for the stock sold today was close to \$142, as against \$98 last year, showing that the demand for a better grade of stock has greatly increased since last year. 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NEWFOUNDLAND AND NAVAL DEFENCE

Negotiations Have Been Opened With the Imperial Cabinet.

St. John's, Nfld., March 5.—With a view to participating in the naval defence of the British Empire, the Newfoundland Government has opened negotiations with the imperial cabinet.

An announcement to that effect was made today by the new governor, Walter Davidson, C.M.G., in the speech from the throne at the opening of the Colonial Legislature.

Governor Davidson also gave notice of the Government's intention to remove the duty from tea, sugar and salted meats. This, it was declared, would represent the abrogation of \$400,000 in duties annually, the largest reduction in taxation at one time in the colony's history.

PAINFULLY HURT

Stove Exploded and Piece of Iron Struck Miss Burwell.

Fingal, March 5.—Miss Ida Burwell was painfully injured at her home near here yesterday, when a stove blew up and she was struck in the chest.

The pipes froze during the night, and when the fire was lighted the pressure on the blocked conduits blew up the stove.

LIGHT ON THE INQUISITION.

Rome, March 5.—The Pope has consented to make accessible for purposes of historical research the secret archives of the Congregation of the Inquisition. Heretofore these archives have been absolutely invisible, and permission to examine them was refused a short time ago even to Abbot Gasquet, Mgr. Duchesne and other prominent ecclesiastical historians.
