The Serbians are reported in a continued advance along the western end of the line, driving the remaining Bulgarians out of Florina and capturing the highest peak in the Kaimakcalan ange, north of Lake Ostrovo.

Greece again appears as a probable new factor in the military field in the Balkans. She is reported to have sent an ultimatum to Germany demanding the return of the Greek troops taken at Kavala by the Bulgarians and sent to Germany for internment.

DEMAND RETURN OF PRISONERS (Canadia n Press.)

Athens, Sept. 19, via London, Sept. 20, 12:20 p.m.—There is reason to believe that the Greek Government has sent an ultim atum to Germany and Bulgaria, expiring Wednesday night, demanding the immediate return of the priso ners taken at Kavala.

When the deep seaport of Kavala was entered by German and Bulgar ops the city was garrisoned by the 4th Gr en, asked the German commander for food and shelter and protection against the Entente forces. The statement said that to prevent any breach of neutrality the Greeks would be transported to Germany to be kept there as

SAY 1,000 WERE TAKEN. The German account of the affair differs radically from that given out at the Allied capitals, and from stories sent out from Athens. The number of the Affied captains, and from stories sent to these versions was less than a soldiers transported to Germany, according to these versions was less than a thensand, one account placing the total at 70 officers and 800 men. The remainder of the garrison is variously said to have been transported to Saloniki by the French authorities, and to be encamped on the Island of Thasos. A recent dispatch from Athens reported the arrival of some members of the Kavala garrison in the Greek capital, but no numbers were given. MAY BE FINAL STEP.
