

GRIFFITH WINS IN DAIL VOTING

De Valera Continues Opposition to Supremacy of New Government.

DEBATES DELAY ACTION

Finance Minister's Feats of Endurance Amaze His Associates.

DUBLIN, March 1.—Numerous clashes occurred again in the Dail Eireann today, feeling running high. Eamon de Valera continued to press for recognition of the Dail's supremacy, but the ministers of the provisional government held firmly that they were supreme and responsible only to the Irish people.

Divisions continue to show there is no doubt that Arthur Griffith is in control.

Observers expressed the opinion tonight that the net result of the two days' debate has been to strengthen the hands of the provisional government and increase public confidence in their ability to handle the situation.

EGYPTIAN CRISIS SOLUTION FOUND

CAIRO, March 1.—Since the return here of Field Marshal Allenby, the British high commissioner, the ministerial crisis has been solved. A new cabinet has been formed by Abdel Khakel Sarwat Pasha, who will take over the premiership and the portfolios of the minister of the interior and minister of foreign affairs. It is expected that negotiations now will begin looking to an agreement abolishing the British protectorate.

The ministerial crisis was solved after a long delay, owing to the refusal of the Egyptian statesmen to form a ministry while relations with Great Britain were considered unsatisfactory.

McKENNA GIVEN INSURANCE POST

MONTREAL, March 1.—Right Hon. Reginald McKenna, former chancellor of the exchequer, has accepted a trusteeship of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada in Great Britain.

Mr. McKenna is a foremost British banker, being chairman of the London Joint City and Midland Bank, and joins Right Hon. Earl of Albemarle, who is at present a trustee.

SEE RETIRAL OF LLOYD GEORGE

Conservative "Die-Hards" Cause Practical Split in Coalition Ranks.

'REBELS' GAIN STRENGTH

Defeat of Government Candidates in By-Elections Show Trend of Nation.

LONDON, March 1.—The report that Premier Lloyd George had threatened to resign has been the political sensation of the day.

Hints of Mr. Lloyd George's resignation have been current ever since Sir George Younger, head of the Conservative party organization, engineered a revolt of some fifty "die-hard" Tories against the premier during the latter's absence at the Cannes meeting.

One outcome of that revolt was a practical split in the coalition and public abandonment of the so-called coupon system, under which heretofore candidates, whether Conservative or Liberal, entered the electoral contests under a united banner.

The attitude of the "die-hards" is that they decline to recognize Lloyd George's leadership unless they are allowed to dictate the policy of the coalition, which would include restoration of the legislative veto to the House of Lords and a protective tariff.

Threatened to Quit.

The prime minister is said to have threatened to resign when he returned from Cannes but was dissuaded by Austen Chamberlain. Since then, disintegration in the coalition has proceeded rapidly, a large body of the Conservatives showing a disposition to support the revolting element.

At the same time, recent by-elections, in which the government candidates were defeated tended to show that the country was completely out of sympathy with the coalition, while the Labor party and the Asquithian Liberals, who opposed the coalition, are constantly gaining strength.

Ever since Parliament reassembled the belief that general elections were approaching has overshadowed all proceedings of a political character both within and outside Parliament.

A meeting of the whole Conservative party will be called at an early date. The general impression is that an election cannot be far distant but there is still an alternative—namely, the resignation of the premier, in which case the king might call on Austen Chamberlain to form a cabinet to carry on the government. This government, in the general opinion, however, would have a short life.

GREEKS RELEASE STEAMER

Espoir Was Seized on February 12, Off Asia Minor.

Athens, March 2.—The Greek government had formally released the steamship Espoir, which was captured by a Greek torpedo boat destroyer off the coast of Asia Minor on Feb. 12. The Espoir sailed from the port of Piraeus after her cargo had been discharged.

France's decision to insist upon immediate restitution of the Espoir's cargo was communicated to the foreign office yesterday by the French minister. Seizure of the Espoir was the subject of two notes to Greece from the French government, the first demanding release of the vessel and cargo and the second threatening retaliatory measures if the request was not granted. The Greek government contended that the cargo was contraband of war destined for the Turkish Nationalist army, with whom the Greeks are at war. France contended that the ship carried only coal for the Anatolia railroads.

FEWER NARCOTICS BEING IMPORTED

Ottawa, March 2.—(Canadian Press).—A marked decrease in the quantity of narcotics imported into Canada, following the inauguration of a system for control of health, is shown by the report of the department, covering the fiscal year ending March 31, 1921. The system of control was inaugurated in the year 1920.

The report shows that imports of cocaine for the year ending March 31, 1921, totaled 12,333 ounces. In the year ending March 31, 1921, the imports dropped to 3,310 ounces. Imports of morphine in 1921 were 30,687 ounces. In 1921, they had dropped to 12,124 ounces. In the year ending March 31, 1921, gum opium to the total quantity of 34,263 pounds was imported. In 1921, the total imports were but 3,953 pounds.

C. P. MAKES CORRECTION.

Montreal, March 2.—On Saturday, Feb. 25, the Canadian Press, Limited, carried the following paragraph in the Montreal story on the Delorme case: "Orders have been issued to Sheriff Lemieux, who was the director of the last Tuesday burlesque, that Father Delorme is to be treated like any other prisoner. This means that he will have to journey to and from the Bordeaux jail in the 'Black Maria,' which makes daily trips between the Montreal courthouse and Bordeaux jail. All classes of prisoners are brought in this car and the nationalities represented are legion." Sheriff Lemieux has complained that this statement is defamatory and libellous, that it is unfair to him and he denies the report that such instructions have been received. The Canadian Press, Limited, has no desire to be unfair to the sheriff and is glad to carry this correction and retraction.

GERALD BEVAN ARRESTED.

Naples, March 2.—The Italian police yesterday arrested Gerald Lee Bevan on the complaint of the British consul, who stated that Bevan was the head of the only Equitable Fire Insurance Company of London, which recently failed with a deficit of £2,000,000.

BARBERS WAIT ON ROLLO ASKING ACT BE DRAFTED

New Legislation Would Provide Special Board to Examine Applicants.

TORONTO, March 1.—Requesting the drafting and passing of a bill to be known as the "Barbers' Act," a deputation of barbers, headed by Controller Joseph Gibbons of Toronto, and Albert Call, secretary of the executive of the Journeymen Barbers' Federation of Ontario, along with members of the executive, waited on Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, today.

The proposed act, a tentative copy of which was passed by the minister, will, if enacted, provide for the examination of applicant barbers before a board to be appointed by the government by order-in-council.

According to the draft act the board must determine whether or not the applicant has studied the occupation for three years as an apprentice, or whether he has taken a course in barbering at a qualified and recognized school for that purpose. Applicants must also prove themselves free from all contagious and infectious diseases. Transfers from other provinces will be recognized.

The deputation also requests that all barbers in Ontario be licensed and that the license shall only be issued after the applicant has sat-

isfied the board that he is a journeyman barber and has answered all questions to their satisfaction.

OWEN SOUND MAN DIES OF INJURIES

OWEN SOUND, March 1.—Wm. J. Whalen, a young, married man, 26 years old, died today as the result of injuries received at the grist mill of Adam Brown and Sons this morning.

His right arm was caught by a revolving shaft when he attempted to move a belt, and was literally pulled out from the shoulder.

CARE OF PLANTS.

CLAIMS HUDSON BAY AREA MINERAL TREASURE HOUSE

C. V. Corliss Points Out Enormous Wealth of Canada's Untapped Resources.

Ottawa, March 2.—In the course of his address before the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy yesterday, C. V. Corliss, president of the institute, referred to Canada's enormous pre-Cambrian area surrounding Hudson Bay, as a veritable treasure house of minerals, where real prospecting had scarcely begun. This area included the nickel mines at Sudbury, silver mines at Cobalt and gold mines at Porcupine, one of which might soon reach the position of the world's greatest producer.

Referring to the great pre-Cambrian areas, which comprise 90 per cent of the province of Quebec, Mr. Corliss predicted that enormous mineral treasures awaited discovery by "the thrifty people of this province."

Charles Campbell, deputy minister of mines, gave an address on "The Mining Industry and Our Railroads."

He urged a more thorough appreciation of the inter-relationship of the two industries in order that there must be a closer co-operation between them, and quoted percentages to illustrate the quantity of minerals carried by the railways.

Prof. Adam Shortt, discussing the economic relations of Canadian gold production, said that it was true that

the increased production of gold and its export would assist in maintaining Canadian exchange at par.

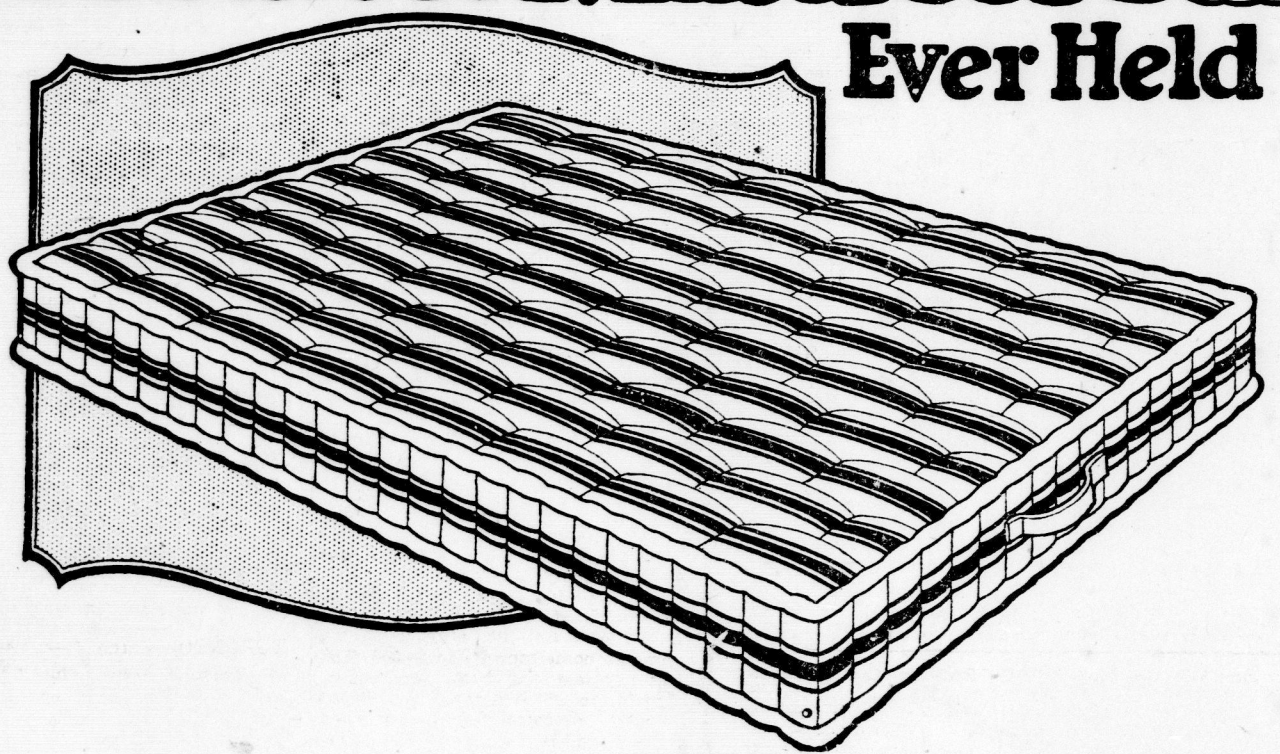
