National Council To Consider Many Questions of Vital Interest

Among the important questions on the agenda of the National Council of Women for consideration at the annual meeting to be held in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Port Arthur, June 19 to 22, and in St. William's Presbyterian Church, Port William, June 23 to 25, are "The Education of the Foreign Born," the speaker to be Hon. S. J. Latta, minister of education, Saskatchewan, formerly of London; "The Problems of the Young Girl," the subject to be presented by Magistrate Margaret Patterson, M.D., of Toronto; "Conditions of the Homeless in Isolated Places," from the viewpoint of Mrs. Hannington, Ottawa, chief lady superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

Introduced to the national council executive by the London local council, Miss Clara Horton, formerly of this city, is to present the subject of a Canadian campaign for correct posture in the interests of health, giving an illustrated lecture.

Mrs. P. Twidale, elderman of the city of Niagara Falls, is going to give a luncheon address opening day on "Women in Municipal Life."

Reports cover such a range of subjects as "Report of the committee on the League of Nations," "Citizenship," "Taxation," "Objectionable printed matter and films," "Fine and applied arts," "Laws," "Mothers' allowances," "Public health," "National recreation," "Mental hygiene," "Immigration work at the port of entry," "Industrial legislation for women," "Child welfare."

The national council will have an opportunity to express its opinion on the subject of race track gambling. A resolution sent up from the Victoria Local Council asks the national council to petition the Federal Government to amend the criminal code of Canada, making the betting-house on the race tracks of Canada illegal.

A resolution on behalf of the Halifax Local Council urges the national council to press upon the government the so-called unearned increment of increasing value of land as a means of augmenting the national revenue that will not be reflected in increased cost of commodities.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, Mrs. R. M. Graham and Miss Stella Macklin, the delegates who have been appointed from the London Local Council, sure, much that will stay in their minds all through life. The hope for the future of the nation is to educate the girls of today in a proper respect for health and in a proper respect for health for themselves and others.

MOTHERCRAFT CLASSES MAKE START BABY WEEK

While the attendance of adults at the baby week exhibit last week in the Technical School was possibly not so large as in former years, when baby clinics were a prominent part, a most encouraging feature to the Child Welfare Association and others looking seriously to the future welfare of the citizenship was the presence every day of numbers of the older schoolgirls, senior grades in the public schools and whole classes in the Technical School attending in a body to hear the lectures and study for themselves the picture posters.

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WORK KEEPS AHEAD OF NURSING STAFF

Considers Increasing Scholarships To Fifty—Dr. McEachern Coming Here.

"If anyone can put the Victorian Order of Nurses on a firm financial footing I am sure it is Dr. Malcolm T. McEachern, the newly-appointed director-general," was the opinion enthusiastically expressed by Miss A. Harris, president of the London branch, after her return from Ottawa, where she has been attending the annual meeting of the national order. "Dr. McEachern, who is coming to London the first week of July, by the way, impressed those who attended the meeting as the right man in the right place," continued Miss Harris. "He was keenly interested, and, far from assuming the position of dictator, all the time he was anxious to learn and get the benefit of the opinion of others. His desire to find out was manifested in the round table conference which he conducted in the afternoon, and which inspired a number to speak who would not have done so under any other circumstances. He wants to arrange, if possible, a round table conference while he is here."

Everywhere the same conditions seemed to be prevailing as in London, tremendous growth in the work, and not enough nurses to cope with it. While we have increased our staff to five in London, seven could be kept busy all the time.

"Coupled with the growing demands of the work is naturally the growing need of adequate funds for financing. We need also more of the specially-trained nurses. Many nurses feel they cannot devote a fourth year to the special public health nursing after taking their three years' hospital course. Owing to this problem, Mrs. Hannington, the chief superintendent, was empowered to approach the branch of nursing education of the Canadian Association of Trained Nurses, which is meeting in London at the Victoria Hotel June 19, with a proposal that it should be optional with nurses-in-training during the last half year to take Victorian order work, with a view later to a post-graduate university course in public health, which would prepare them to join the order."

To make it possible for more nurses to take the post-graduate work to fit them for Victorian order service, the Victoria Order in Canada wants to offer 50 post-graduate scholarships for courses in public health, the nurses undertaking to serve with the order for a subsequent period of three years. The subject was brought up at the annual meeting of forming three distinct centres, Maritime Provinces to constitute one group, Ontario and Quebec another, and the provinces west of Winnipeg, including British Columbia, the third. In this connection strong emphasis was laid on the importance of keeping the Victorian Order a national institution, hence, with three districts, each having a superintendent, the central board would still function, paying the salaries of said superintendents.

One thing that Mrs. Hannington said in her report which summed up the work very beautifully and effectively, I thought, was this: "Our work is on the very human side, and we walk the humble ways of life. Our nursing service is a most strenuous one, seven days a week, including emergency night calls. It is most discouraging to see the number of people who get into something to be proud of, in that they have been answered uncomplainingly for 25 years—a record not attained by any other nursing service on the American continent."

"Figures quoted gave some idea of the enormous amount of nursing work expended. Mrs. Hannington stated the total local revenue from all sources for the service in 1921 was \$389,788.62. The total number of visits paid was over half a million, 568,767. The marked increase of the pre-natal visits was regarded as a very hopeful sign."

Dr. McEachern has begun his work of making a survey of the Victorian Order of Nurses and the public health nursing facilities from coast to coast, with a view to finding the most satisfactory basis of co-operation for the Victorian Order with all of these. He has been through the Maritime Provinces, and goes West after his visit in Western Ontario. I do not know whether Dr. McEachern's appointment has already given new inspiration, but I do know the meeting this year was more largely attended and more alive to the opportunities and needs than any year ago."

Miss Harris drew attention to the type of men who are identified with the executive, and who are directing the welfare of the organization. "C. H. Magrath, chairman of the international joint waterways commission, is now president, succeeding Dr. Thomas Gibson, head of the order from 1918. The honorary secretaries are Major W. D. Herdridge and Duncan Campbell Scott; the honorary treasurers, Sir George Burn and Col. C. A. Elliott, and the honorary counsel, Dr. Charles Morse."

CHOIR ELECTS OFFICERS.

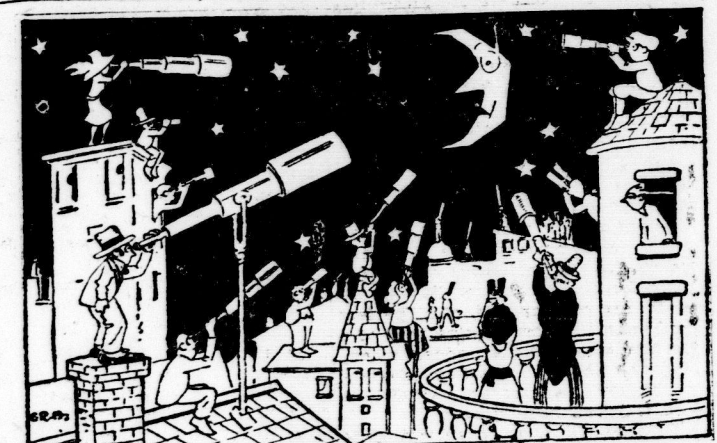

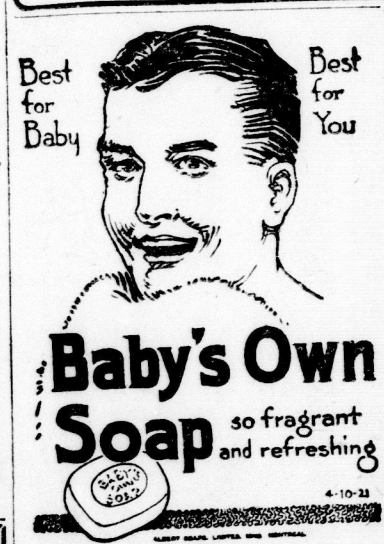
