

Three O.H.A. Classes Nearing Home Stretch in Race for Titles

THIS WEEK WILL SEE FINALISTS LOOMING

Tonight's Games Mean Three Junior O. H. A. Outfits Eliminated.

FIVE IN INTERMEDIATE

Home and Home Series To Decide Senior Title Next Week.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—The Senior O. H. A. group champions will be determined this week, as both group play-offs are billed. In group No. 1 Varsity plays at Hamilton Tuesday with the return game here Friday. While in the other group Preston plays in Stratford Tuesday with the second game in Preston Thursday. The two group winners will play home and home games next week. Those who have followed the teams closely this year are of the opinion that Stratford will win the western group and Varsity is a slight favorite over Hamilton, although the latter has lots of support.

The intermediate series has been reduced to five teams, with Peterboro securing the bye in the semi-final round. Collingwood plays the first game in Niagara Falls Monday, with the second in Collingwood Thursday. Guelph and New Hamburg are drawn together in the fifth round, but the dates have not yet been announced, although one game at least will be played this week. There is a possibility of New Hamburg transferring its home games from now on to Kitchener.

Nine teams are still in the junior series, but three of them will be eliminated Monday. Peterboro meets Bowmanville at Whitby in a replay of the game that was stopped in Bowmanville last week with six minutes to play. Peterboro will enter the game with a four-goal lead, but if Bowmanville overcomes this they will have to play their remaining home games at Whitby, owing to failure to control the crowd in Bowmanville.

Belleville and Cleve Six of Kingston, who were unable to return a winner in home and home games, will play a sudden death at Port Hope, and the winner will meet the survivor of the Bowmanville-Peterboro series on Wednesday and Friday. Owen Sound, Kitchener and Hamilton are the other three remaining teams in the west, but they will not be drawn until Newmarket and Parry Sound play off their tie at Beaverton Monday.

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KING GEORGE SEES ENGLISH TEAM WIN

Cardiff City Takes Measure of Bristol City in Soccer Cup-tie Game.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—England maintained its unbeaten record in international rugby matches this season when it defeated France by 19 points to 7 yesterday at Twickenham. The match was played in fine weather, the ground being in splendid condition. The attendance was given out at 25,000. King George was present, being introduced to the players before the start of the match. Scotland won from Ireland 13 to 8, the game being played at Edinburgh. The sensation of the soccer cup ties in England and Scotland today was the defeat of Glasgow Rangers by Hibernians by 2 to 1. The game, one of the Scottish third round matches, was played on the Rangers' own grounds. In the English third round matches, Cardiff easily accounted for Bristol City and Aston Villa for Leeds. The last London team in the series disappears with the defeat of Crystal Palace by Swindon. Derby and Whitehall were drawn together in the fifth round, but the dates have not yet been announced, although one game at least will be played this week. There is a possibility of Derby transferring its home games from now on to Kitchener.

The visitors were all ready to pack up after the first game when the homesters rolled 129 to 132, most made by their opponents, but poor work on scores, coupled with inability to pick the head pin in the remaining games, lost them what chance they had of taking the series.

St. Thomas Athletic Body Hopes To Send Amateur Champ To Olympics.

St. Thomas, Feb. 24.—Harry Henning, middleweight amateur champion of Canada, and Cy Pook, amateur light-heavy champ, furnish the feature for the big boxing and wrestling meet here Friday under the auspices of the Elgin Regiment A. A. A. in the armories.

Cy is seriously attempting to make a berth on the Olympic team and, with this end in view, a coach was secured to assist with the training. Since then the Elgin Regiment has been matching him with some of the hardest fighters in Ontario. Henning was given a decision over Pook in St. Thomas after the five rounds, and his fight in this city next Friday is viewed as a crucial test in his career.

The meet is made all the more interesting by a wrestling attraction. Pete Laing, Ontario amateur champion, will take the mat against Tirsch of Hamilton. Laing is looking forward to a position in the Olympic team and will defend his title to the limit.

The management considers itself especially fortunate in securing a bout between "Dutch" Bellingier of Toronto and "Curly" Murrell of London.

The other bouts arranged are Art Woodhead of London, and A. Bedson of Toronto. "Smiling" Gardner will meet Frankie Tirsch, Toronto. W. Brown of the United Vets will meet McFarquhar of London, and Herbie Cabot is matched with "Bumps" Wright of the Vets. Barber, Ontario amateur 125-pound champion, will meet George Smith of Toronto.

Lou Marsh of Toronto will referee. The judges have not been named yet.
