AN UNDIVINE DEVINE.

EXAMINATION OF KINGSTON AND ANOTHER IN DUBLIN.

Evidence of a Feminine Informer.—Pitot and Intention of the Assessor Society.—Further Arrests Made and Prosecuted.

DUNDAS, April 27.—A printer named Gibney and Eugene Kingston were arrested to-day on a charge of conspiracy to murder Pitot, the fanian centre who turned informer.

Devine, arrested at the time of the affair when Detective Cox was murdered, swore that he was a fanian. He stated that several fanians, including Sullivan, the schoolmaster, imprisoned as a suspect, and one Boland of Manchester, condemned Pitot to death, and ordered Kingston to execute the sentence.

He also swore that the society of which the prisoners were members devoted to murder Detective Cox and Judge Lawson. The society also sentenced Kingston, director of the Irish criminal investigation department, and Malloy, chief of the detectives, to death.

It plotted to destroy by dynamite the house in which the crown witness lodge and murder the informers Kenny and Bailey. He further said dissections were made of the bodies of the murderers and Sullivan was also sentenced to death. Gibney was appointed to cooperate in the murder of Pitot. The prisoners were remanded for a week.

An artisan named Healy was also arrested here last evening on a charge of conspiring to murder, and arraigned this morning.

Another prisoner arrested in connection with the murder conspiracy in the Craughan district, was named O'Brien. It is expected his statements will lead to more arrests.

Eight warrants for the arrest of men have been issued in consequence of revelations of Devine to-day.
