HAD A BROKEN NECK 5 MONTHS

NEWS RECEIVED OF THE DEATH OF B. S. V. PALMER.

on July 18 He Fractured Wis Neck at Nt. agara—His Body, Except the Head, Became Paralysed—Successful Operation Followed by a Trip to England-Paralysis of the Lungs Caused Death.

News was received in the city yesterday of the death at London, England, of Mr. R. S. V. Palmer, the young Engrishman who fractured his spine at Niagara-on-the-Lake while diving on

July 18 last. Mr. Palmer was bathing and diving in shallow water, struck on his head, dislocating and fracturing the laminae of the fourth and fifth cervical vertebrae. His entire frame, with the exception of the head, became paralyzed, and the attending physician decided that an operation was the last slender hope for

The operation, which consisted in removing the fractured portion of the wertebrae, was successfully performed, and for a time hopes were entertained of the patient's complete recovery.

From the Queen's Hotel, Niagara-onthe Lake, he was removed to the Toronto General Hospital, where, after two mouths of careful nursing and skilful treatment, he gained sufficient strength to permit him to undertake a voyage across the Atlantic to join his wife.

Writing to a lady in this city, Mrs. Edith Palmer, widow of the deceased, gives the following account of her hushard's death: Mr. Palmer retired to bed as usual on Friday night, Dec. 7, but at 12 o'clock he began to get restless and had a cough, and from that time he grew rapidly worse. At 2 o'clock physicians were summoned, but before they arrived Mr. Palmer died at 3 o'clock from paralysis of the lungs, He died without a struggle. The funeral took place on Wednesday.
