

## Sir James Whitney Dead

Sir James Whitney, Prime Minister of Ontario, died unexpectedly at his residence, 113 St. George Street, Toronto, about 12 o'clock noon on Friday last. Following an illness that became serious Following an illness that became serious about one year ago and continued with varying severity throughout the winter, manifesting itself again a few weeks ago, the end came Friday, when the Premier succumbed to an attack of cerebral hemorrhage. This is the official announcement contained in a bulletin issued by Dr. H. J. Hamilton, the Premier's medical adviser.

ical adviser.
Sir James Whitney was born at Will-iamsburg, Dundas county, October 2, 1843. Educated at Cornwall Grammar School. Studied law in office of John Sandfield Macdonald. Called to the Bar in 1876, and began practice in Merris-Bourne-Kennedy, that the orders in 1876, and began practice in Merrisburg. Conservative candidate in Dundas county for the Legislature in 1886; defeated by small majority. Elected at bye-election two years later, holding the seat until the time of his death. A Fenian raid veteran and at one time Lieutenant-Colonel commanding the Dundas Reserve Militia. Chosen leader of the Conservative Opposition in the Legislature in 1896. Called to the Premership of Ontario on January 25, 1905, by a large majority; re-elected in 1908 and large majority; re-elected in 1908 and 1911. Knighted by King Edward on the occasion of the Quebec Tercentenary celebration in 1908. Died September 25, 1914. The remains were intered at Morris burg, on Tuesday.
