TO FIGHT CORN BORER IN LAMBTON

Mass Meeting to Organize Effective Warfare Called for Thursday, October 30th, in Petrolia Town Hall.

The miserable pest, the corn borer, has, according to Government reports, damaged the corn crops of Western Ontario this year to the extent of a million and a quarter dollars. No wonder drastic efforts to eliminate this pest are being undertaken. Concerted action is necessary, for it is of no use for one farmer to battle single-handed, so corn growers must unite in the struggle. Splendid work in this direction has been done in this vicinity this year and there will be no quarter shown next year. The Government is helping all it can and is continually seeking more effective measures.

Following are two letters which are being broadcasted throughout the county by the efficient agricultural representative, W. P. MacDonald:

Petrolia, October 17, 1924.

Dear Sir:

The enclosed statistics in reference to the Corn Borer infestation have been compiled by the Provincial & Dominion Entomologists, who have made a careful survey of this district. How does it appeal to you? You will agree with me that the farmers of Lambton County are in danger of having their crops annihilated within the course of two years. Recall the effects of the Pea Weevil and what happened to our field pea crop.

Recall how the San Jose Scale destroyed the apple orchards in the south part of the County.

The Corn Borer demands immediate action. For this purpose a Mass Meeting of farmers and citizens of the County will be held in Petrolia.

Place—Town Hall.

Date—Thursday, Oct. 30, 1924.

Hour—2 P. M.

The County Press is co-operating in calling the citizens' attention to the Mass Meeting. Township Councils, the County Council, Agricultural Society Directors, Corn Growers Association Directors and all public bodies are being notified. Please make an effort to attend, and notify your neighbours.

The meeting will be addressed by experts. Control measures will be adopted.

This startling information demands the most serious consideration of every citizen of Lambton County.
