The Boxer rebels in Pekin have been dispersed. They will be positively no more fighting. Further military operations on the part of the powers are greatly to be deplored.

London, Aug. 23.—"To-day 1,000 American attacked the Imperial Palace," says a dispatch to the Morning Post from Pekin held there. Lieut. E. Fitch has also gone.

A number of Americans are now among the Imperial guards, and the Imperial Bank has been looted.
