**LIG BATTING.**

It is said that Leisk, of the Hamilton Club, in its late match with the Montrealers, made the highest individual score ever made on this continent—202 runs—not out. In 1874 Captain Wallace, of the Halifax garrison, made 158, and in 1876 Joseph Hargreaves, in Germantown v. a mixed team, made 168, which have hitherto been the two highest scores in America. Leisk has thus achieved the proud distinction of being the first man on this continent who has reached the two centuries. He is an old Glasgow player, and has always been considered one of the best bats in Canada. His average last year was 26 runs per innings, which was second only in the first-class clubs to the 27 of Simonds, or the Montreal Club.

Port Hope beat Toronto on the Cricket Ground here, on the 25th ult., by 68 and 58 to 58 and 60—3 runs.

The game at Montreal on the 25th ult., between the St. George's and Ottawa, was decided in favour of the latter by the result of the first innings, 93 to 65. In their second innings, Ottawa made 68; St. George, 42, for four wickets.

Ottawa credited itself with a victory over Hamilton, at Montreal, on the 26th ult. The

Port Hope beat Hamilton at the former place on Saturday last, by two wickets. Hamilton 121 and 88, Port Hope 115 and 46. In the second innings Logan, of Port Hope, bowled seven wickets for as many runs.

Galt won a game from Paris on Friday last, at the latter place, by a majority of 65 runs in a two innings game.

The exhibition throughout was a splendid display of science and skill, Joe Dion handling the cue with that easy grace characteristic of the finished player. **SWIMMING.**

THE TORONTO CLUB.—The first race of the season took place on Saturday morning last, from Armour's boat-house at six o'clock. The water was beautifully calm, and a finer morning could not have been desired. The distance swum was 100 yards, and seven competitors faced the starter, viz:—Messrs. C. Thompson, E. Thompson, H. Alexander, T. Doble, G. Woodhouse, G. Warwick, and A. D. Stewart. A splendid start was effected, and the race was won by Stewart, who came in about twenty yards ahead of Doble, Warwick being a good third. Mr. J. L. Maughan officiated as judge.

THOMAS L. YOUNG.—This fast trotting gelding has been getting only road work this Spring. He will go into training shortly. The last race he was engaged in was at Fleetwood Park, N. Y., in the Fall of 1875, and was for a match of \$2,000, with Sensation. He won the first heat in 2:19½, his present record. The second was announced a dead heat in 2:22½. The race then came to a conclusion through the withdrawal of Young by his driver, Charlie Green, who claimed that he won the heat. Sensation was then jogged over the track and declared the winner; Thos. L. Young distanced.

ZOO ZOO vs. IDALIA.—Another match has been made between Zoo Zoo and Idalia for \$1,000 a side, to be run at the second meeting of the Saratoga Association. By the terms of the match the pair are to take their positions at the three-quarter pole and gallop together to the half-mile pole, where they will receive the word from the starter and run one mile and a half. The object of this arrangement is to enable Idalia, who is very fractious in a standing start from the post, to get under way before the word is given, thus equalizing the chances of the two fillies, both of the Messrs. Lorillard being anxious to give them a fair test as a means of deciding which of the two is the better three-year old of the year.
