The Methodist Missionary Society has now possession of a very fine property here. It consists of a commodious church, com. fortable mission-house, and school-house, all comparatively new. The dimonsions of the scinool (built last summer) are leugth 80 ft., breadth 18 ft ., posts 12 ft . Cottage roof, rustic outside, singlo-dressed cedar lining.
