or two, on the miture and object of the course, the rules of philosophisiag, and the general properties of matter ; the Professor pruceeded to diccuss the following subjects:-1, Attraction of gravitation; 2, Electricity; 3, Magnetism; 4, Gal sanism; 5, Magneto-Dlectricity ; 6, Electro-Mirgnetism ; 7, Thermo-Blectricity ; 8, Dynamics, including latiss of motion and mechanical powers; 9 , Pneumatics; 10, Hydro-dynamics, including IIydrostatics andHydraulics; 11, Opties, includiner Dioptrics, and Catoptrics, Chromatics and Polarization; 12, Heat; 13, Chemistry. From this enumeration, it will bo seen, that a rery thorough system of Natural Phylosophy is brought under the review of our students; and the Board have particularly marked the effurts which the Professor is making to heep his course up to the improrements and diseoveries of the present day.The whole course was illustrated with experiments. And here the Board would ; press upon the attention of Synod, the inecessity of adding to their apparatus, ans there are not a few experiments highly interesting and instructive which can with difticulty he performed with the present appuratus, and some that cannot be performed at all. Upon the whole, the Board have to express their thorongh satisficction, and they have esery reason to hope that the Synod will be thoroughly satisfied also, with this very necessiary and useful institution of our Church.

The Session of the Seminary for 1853 wias opened in the Meeting House, West River, on Wednesday March 2d. The Board were in attendiance. The Professor delivered a lecture on "the Freedom of the Will," At the close of the lecture the studonts were addressed by the ministers present. Twelve students were enrolled, three of whom were admitted for the first time. The qualifications of the students admitted, were found on carmination, to be of a much higher order on this than on former ycars. This was peculiarly gratifying to the Board, particulariy. as tho improrement made may, to no small extent, be traced up to the influence of the Seminary itself:

session has gone, the Report of Professor Ross will bé sufficiently satisfactory,

Report of Profiessor Ross,-The numher of students whose namps havo been entered unon the Matriculation Book, for the Term commencing March 1853 , is 15 . Of this number, 4 have entered for the first time. The number in attendance upon the Junior Latin and Greek Classes is 10. In the Senior Latin and Greek Classes 5 are in attendance. The Junior Latin Class has read 60 chapters of the Jugurthine war.The Junior Greak Class have read 35 pages of the 1st vol. of the Majora, containing extracts from Herodotus and most of the extracts from Thucydides. The Senior Latin Class has read, 45 chapters of the 1st book of Livy. The Scnior Greek Class has read 24 pares of the lst vol. of the Majora containing extracts from the first Philippic,and the first and second Olynthiac of Demosthenes, and 34 pages of the second rol. of ${ }^{\prime \prime}$ the Nrajora containing extracts from " the Udysscy of Homer. Wednesdays and Saturdays are deveted to Mair's Introduction to Latin Syntax, the Greek Grammer, and Fisks' Greek exercisès. In Mair's Introduction we have gone, over most of the Greek Grammar and about 150 sentences in the Greek exercises. In the Senior Mathematic Class we have read 24 Propositions in the 6th book of Euclid; and in the Junior Class, 28 Propositions in the first book. In Al-' gehra, the farthest advanced student has gone through equidifferent progression; another has nearly completed quadratic.". equations ; sereral have advanced thro ${ }^{\circ}$ fractions, while others have not yet" mastered division. The Mathematic $\&$ Algebra Classes meet only on alternate. days. The Logic class, containing 6 students, hare gone through the first part of the course, and have made some progress in the second. The mental power at present under discussion, is, Judgment, Lach of the students in this clase has written several ascays.The Moral Philosophy Class nunibers $\$$. students.
