Owing to circumstances over which he had no control, this was the first Medical Convocation of the University which he had been able to attend, and he was so pleased at what he had seen and heard, that he sincerely hoped he might have the privilege of being present often. He spoke of the great and noble work of the profession of Medicine and of the excellent work their Faculty of Medicine was doing. He alluded to having in pastoral visits in his diocese, met a medical graduate of Bishop's College, who had been of immense assistance to him, undertaking with a will and determination the financial duties which formed part of his duty, while on his visit, thus relieving him greatly. It would in his opinion be a scheme worthy of consideration, to give in the medical school to the clergy going into distant and sparsely settled districts, an outline of medicine—something similar to "first aid to the injured." After alluding to the interesting time all had had, His Lordship sat down.

The Chancellor then declared the Convocation closed.
