Arctic Forbfs, writer, rider, reporter and military man, will certainly, so be says, come to this country this fall to lecture.

The next volume of Dicares' letters will be read with dcep interest. It contains the much talked of correspondence between Mr. Dichens and the late Lord Litton on the subject of "spirituqlism." These two famous writors hold opinions on that subject precisely opposite each other, and their letters are understood to convey the grounds for their antagonistic beliofs. Tho mystical tendency early foreshadow. ed in " Zanoni," and which found confirmatory expressiou in "A Strange Story," Was characteristic of a mind readily attracted by theories and their alleged illustration in facts which were repuganant to the author of Picavica and the crentor of Grudarind; and it will be to many a subject of curiosity to see how the respective notions of these two celebrated men were set forth and apheld.

Riceard A Proctor has been writing to the New York Herald his opinions of Thaceemat aud Dickens, his criticism being evoked by the report of the interview with Thonlow Weed. Peoctor considers that neither of the novelists showed akill in their plots, though Dicrens excelled Tracrerar in this respect. Iu draming character Thacmerax is said to surpass Dichens, and to be far ahead of Scott. Tiaceerar'H power of portraiture is especially marked, says Procton, in his women, though it is the custom of women to say that Thackerar's creations are all alike. Each of these chorneters is atrong and individnal. Dickens' women on the contrary are patcliwork, being derived in some cases, from four models. In the same way Diceens' men were combinations of different characters known to the author. Phoctor is of opinion that Diceens had little creniive faculty, but excelled in both, and the authors wrote English about equally well. George Eliot is as fat ahend of Thackeray ag Tuacmerat is ahead of Drcmens-a distance as great as that which separates Brownino and Tennyson-so says Procror.

That many actors and actresses of the Fronch stage dovote considerable attontion to literary pursnits is well known. MM. Copoemin and Muunet Solle are lecturers. M Coque. un cadet writes in the I'intamarre, under the siguature "Pironcte," and will shortiy publish a volume, "Le Livre des Convalescents." M, Truffier, of the Gomedie Francaise, is the author of a volume of poems, 'Sous les Frises;' MM. Tnuffier and Cressonois, of the Odeon, are mriting "Trilles Galantes;" N. Doponr" Vennon is the author of 'L'Art de Bien Dire," M. M. Ponel and Monval are at work on a history of the Odeon. M. Geonges Ricaard, of the Odeon, has had $a$ hand in "Les Enfants," three acts, "Pierre Gendron," three acts, with Lafontaine, and in "Hoole;" M. Pierre Berton, of the Vaudeville, is the author of the "Jurons de Cadillac;" M. Lafontane has written a novel, "La Servante." There are other less known actors who are also writers, but among the ladies Mdlo. Saraf Berniardt has written "Impressioss d'une Chaise," for the Globe; Malle. Roossew, a novel, "La Fille d'un Proscrit;" Nalle. Leonide Ledlano, "Lea - Petites Comedies del' Amour :" Mdlle. Teeresa wrate ostensibly her memoirs, with MM. ALbeat Wolff and Erneet Buom; Malle. SozanNe Lacier is writing her "Confideoces," and Madle. Thenand is writing a monologue, "La Presentation."
