Washington, March 9.—A Council of war was held to-day, in which not only the President, Gen. Grant, Gen. Halleck, and most of the cabinet participated. in the campaign. Orders will instantly go to bring the 11th and 12th corps from Chattonocga, and the 16th and 17th corps from the Mississippi.
