Hon. André Ouellet (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): Mr. Speaker, I suggest the intention was to incorporate certain sentences in the Speech from the Throne to explain the activities of the board. #### SUGGESTED USE OF WINE IN PLACE OF MILK

**Mr. Réal Caouette (Témiscamingue)**: Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of National Health and Welfare.

Since the recent increase in milk prices, ministers have suggested different measures to Canadian consumers. The Minister of Agriculture has advocated drinking wine instead of milk because it is cheaper. For the same reason, the Minister of National Health and Welfare has recommended drinking powder milk. Does he think it is as nourishing as natural milk and could he tell us how to have newborn babies drink wine instead of natural milk?

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of National Health and Welfare): As minister responsible for the status of women, I will consider the second part of the hon. member's question.

As to the first part, Mr. Speaker, I never did recommend anything, I just said what my family and I do to reduce the price of our milk consumption.

Mr. Whelan: Mr. Speaker, if I heard the hon. member correctly—and if I did not I apologize—I think he suggested that I suggested that wine could take the place of milk. I never suggested that at any time. No one in his right mind would suggest that wine could take the place of milk. I did say, however, according to some surveys which have been taken, that wine could do some good for people who suffer from iron deficiency.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

**Mr. Whelan:** It also contains Vitamin C and I think Timothy said, if you look in the good book, that wine is good for your stomach and other ailments from which you [Mr. McGrath.] might suffer. I also said that wine and beer could be made easier than milk. No scientist nor engineer has yet invented anything better than a cow which can transfer roughage into a healthful food on which man could sustain life if necessary.
