OPPORTUNITY TO APPOINT CHARGÉ D'AFFAIRES TO NICARAGUA

Mr. Jim Manly (Cowichan—Malahat—The Islands): Mr. Speaker, according to the first report of the Special Committee on the Central American Peace Process, in line with the spirit of the Esquipulas II Accord and to encourage negotiations, the United States should end its economic embargo against Nicaragua and stop objecting to the granting of loans to Nicaragua by international financial institutions. Furthermore, the U.S. should be urged to maintain its decision to stop supplying military aid to the Contras.

The Committee recommended as a minimum solution to inadequate Canadian representation the appointment of a *chargé d'affaires* in Nicaragua, because relations between Nicaragua and the United States have worsened and Canada's role has become very important.

I urge the Government to act quickly on the Committee's recommendations on the peace process.

REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION

REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE FOR GLENGARRY—PRESCOTT—RUSSELL CONSTITUENCY

Mr. Don Boudria (Glengarry—Prescott—Russell): Mr. Speaker, on June 30, the federal Government's Industrial Regional Development Program, better known as IRDP, ended. This good program was established, naturally, by the Liberal Government in the early 1980s.

Mr. Speaker, there is therefore no remaining federal program to encourage industry to set up in the rural regions of eastern and northern Ontario.

Although it is true that Ontario is doing well, the situation in my riding of Glengarry—Prescott—Russell is not so rosy. The Prescott area, for example, is still suffering from an unacceptable unemployment rate of over 12 per cent.

SENIOR CITIZENS

INCIDENTS OF ABUSE

Mr. Andrew Witer (Parkdale—High Park): Mr. Speaker, Canada's senior citizens are one of our most valuable resources and, unfortunately, one of our most vulnerable. Having made an invaluable contribution to our country, many seniors are now threatened by growing incidents of elder abuse.

There have been cases reported where senior citizens have been mistreated by landlords, made prisoners in their own home or forced to turn over their small pensions to abusive relatives.

Last month in Toronto representatives of the Government and community groups met to formulate a strategic plan to deal with the problem. They proposed changes to the Criminal Code, expanded education of the public, and increased research and data collection on abuse cases.

I urge the Minister of State for Seniors (Mr. Hees) and the Minister of National Health and Welfare (Mr. Epp) to commit all of the resources required and to seek the co-
