Today the Montreal area has more than 215,000 unemployed workers on the books. In downtown Montreal the unemployment rate was 18 per cent at the beginning of this year.

The situation is depressing in other urban centres in Quebec as well. During the past year, the unemployment rate has gone up in Chicoutimi, Jonquière, Quebec City, Trois-Rivières and Sherbrooke. The average rate for

these four centres is 13.7 per cent, which is 2 per cent above the national average.

This is intolerable. The Tory government has ignored the plight of the people of Montreal and of all Canadians. The government's priority should be to bring pride and prosperity back to the Montreal area and to Canada as a whole, but to do that we will have to get rid of the Tories and elect a Liberal government.
