Wins Hotel Handicap at
Jamestown—Long Shot
Lands the Third.

NORFOLK, Va., April 16.—Flabber-
gast, piloted by Wolfe, won the feature
at Jamestown today, the Monticello Hand-
icap, in good time, considering the state
of the track. John Furlong, the favorite,
finished second, his heavy impost and the
water-soaked track proving too much
of an impediment. The rainy weather
caused a sharp cut in the lists, and only
