WEDNESDAY MORNING
INCREASED SUPPLY
ACTED AS WEIGHT

Wheat Quotations Declined
Somewhat—Buying to
Cover Short Sales.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—World's available
supply figures, showing an increase nearly
double that of a year ago, acted as a
weight today on the price of wheat.

Altho the market was steady at the close,
latest quotations were 1/4 to 1/2 cent
lower than last night. Corn lost 1/4 to 1/2 cent,
and oats 1/4 to 1/2 cent. In provisions, the
outcome was a decline varying from a
shade to 40c.

Most of the buying of wheat today
seemed to be merely for the purpose of
covering short sales. Bull speculators
were discouraged by continued large re-
ceipts northwest, and became still more
depressed when announcement was made
that the world's available stock now ex-
ceeded last year's total by more than
\$6,000,000 bushels.

Wheat Bears Had Advantage.
Liverpool dispatches reported that the
Canadian offers and of big Russian ship-
ments looked for, tended to give wheat
bearers an advantage from the outside.
Seasonable weather prevailing over the
winter crop belt in the U.S. counted
also against the bulls and prevented any
reaction worthy of notice. There was no
report demand.

In the corn crowd, general selling of
September proved the main feature.
Most of the business, however, was in
small lots, a fact which led to the belief
that the aggregate open interest was not
so large as the trade had supposed. Un-
settled weather lifted the market to a
slight extent early in the session, but
the effect soon wore off.

Oats had a heavy undertone. The
reason appeared to rest in liberal
Canadian offers and of big Russian ship-
ments looked for, tended to give wheat
bearers an advantage from the outside.

Liquidating sales by holders eased the
provision market. The only decided de-
cline, however, was in September pork,
which was freely supplied by a leading
surround.

Let Your Influence Be Bene-
ficial, Says President
Falconer.

REASON RULES WORLD
Evil Consequences of Mob
Spirit Pointed Out in An-
nual Address.

Congregated for the first time in
Convocation Hall yesterday afternoon,
about 2500 of the student body of To-
ronto University demonstrated that
their lung capacity is of the same high
class order as of yore. Even the new-
ly-born freshman class contributed its
first yell, and the class of '17 is now
in existence as a factor in college life.

The gathering yesterday afternoon was
on the occasion of President Falconer's
annual address of welcome and ad-
vice to the students, both old and new.
Dwelling on the force likely to be
felt upon Canada as a result of the
recent geological and medical conven-
tions which were recently held in To-
ronto and London, President Falconer
proceeded to the main part of his ad-
dress, which was based on Viscount
Haldane's speech to the Bar Associa-
tion at Montreal in September. A plea
for democratic leadership was the text
of the president's message. Reference
was made to the resignation of Chan-
cellor Burwash of Victoria College and
Prof. Vandermissen, whose work in
the university was eloquently re-
ferred to. The untimely death of Dr.
Penton was also mentioned, as well as
those of several students.

Function of Law.
Lord Haldane's speech to the Bar
Association, said President Falconer,
was on the original and fundamental
functions of law, and was, perhaps
most applicable to University of To-
ronto students. Fear of public opin-
ion was referred to as a more potent
force toward law observance than the
of the officers of justice. The mind of
the mob and what that involved was
dealt with being pointed out. The
mob rule was destructive of individ-
uality. Life was essentially ration-
al and the rational had gradually
thru the course of history, basing
placing the irrational. The growth of
this quality in any democracy was
spoken of and the rational added.
amid cheers that the thought there was
no in University of Toronto life also.

The address was closed by reference
to Lincoln's words, "Resolve highly."
Right resolution, the intangible, said
the president, is easily communicative
from mind to mind. The students
were urged to conduct themselves in
such a manner that their influence
would be beneficial to the life of the
university.

question.

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND
REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of
a family, or any male over 15 years old,
may homestead a quarter-section of
available Dominion land in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant
must appear in person at the Dominion
Lands Agency Sub-agency for the dis-
trict. Entry by proxy may be made
at any agency, on certain conditions, by
father, mother, son, daughter, brother or
sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead on a
farm of at least 80 acres solely owned
and occupied by him or by his father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may pre-empt a quarter-
section alongside his homestead. Price,
\$3.00 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the home-
stead or pre-emption six months in each
of six years from date of homestead
entry (including the time required to
earn homestead patent), and cultivate
fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his
homestead right and cannot obtain a
pre-emption may enter for a homestead
in certain districts. Price \$3.00
per acre. Duties: Must reside six
months in each of three years, cultivate
fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300,
