Wheat at Chicago Ruled Higher, But Corn Was

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.-Wheat today showed strength largely because of a radical fal'ing off in world shipments. Closing prices were steady at a shade to 3-8c net advance. Corn lost 1-8c to 3-8c and oats 1-4c to 3-8c. In provisions the market in general finished with a range of 7 1-2c off to 12 1-2c

with a range of 7 1-2c off to 12 1-2c up. October pork was an exception, being hammered down to 75c.

Total world shipments of wheat were only 5,800.000 against 12.585.000 oushels last week and 11.584.000 busnels a year ago. Other buinsh causes that started prices sharply upward at the outset included the tightness of December contracts in the English trade smaller receipts northwest and a renewal of unessiness over weather and crop conditions in India and argentina.

Messages from Buenos Ayres relievating that the outlook was for at least an average yield of wheat led to a temporary setback in prices. The effect was increased thru bearlsh announcements in regard to winter crop progress in the United States.

Weather Favors Corn.

Corn was sold heavily on account of weather more favorable than had been looked for. At times the the market buiged in sympathy with wheat and hi consequence if improved industrial and shipping demand. Sales by the country were notably small and country arrivals insignificant.

Canadian oats were being bought here for storage and meanwhile were being heaged in the pit by sales for May delivery. This process more than offset the fact that rural shipments were extremely light, and that the south was cutbidding Chicago in a good share of the territory which usually markets here.

LONDON, Oct. 31 .- (C. A. P.) -To those who have followed developments in the C. P. R. case in Vienna, the re-

in the C. P. R. case in Vlenna, the reports of the parliamentary committee on emigration, which will be submitted to parliament tomorrow, will cause no surprise. The net result of the inquiry is that the C. P. R. company is cleared of the greater part of the accusations laid at its door.

The commissioners have decided that the increase in the numbers of emigrants originated in distress in the country, and lack of work in Galicia and other provinces, and recommended that local governments should take measures to provide employment for laborers. The more serious accusations against the Canadian Pacific company are held to be unfounded.

This rapid settlement of the question is, of course, due to active diplomatic intervention. The release of the Bowman Hotel property as an addition to the civic square was defeated today by a majority of 206.
