

new cut-off line in the Township of York and Scarborough, starting from the new Union Station up Yonge street north. The mileage from Yonge street to Bayview avenue is 1.4 miles; to the C.P.R. Leaside station 2.4 miles; to Leslie street, exactly 3 miles, where the new Canadian Northern station will be on the north side of the track on a piece of land owned by Mr. Robt. Davies and at the end of Boudart avenue. This new station is also within a stone's throw of where viaduct No. 3 of the C.P.R. springs over the west Don. The new line leaves the Canadian Pacific 3.3 miles from Yonge street, just across the West Don. The fourth mile is at the Don road, where a station may be located and called Donlands. The fifth mile is just over the main Don on the east bank and on the property of Harvey Armstrong. The sixth mile is on the York side of the Scarborough and York town line. The seventh mile is exactly a mile on the Township of Scarborough, and the junction, with the existing line is exactly at 7.60 miles from Yonge street.

Trackage Land Bought.
The Canadian Northern has purchased a large amount of property to be pooled more or less with the C.P.R. and beyond this the following expropriations are to be made along the joint line and the new line:

The new joint yard of the railways is on the north side and begins just beyond Bayview avenue and runs over a mile east to Leslie street, where the station of the Canadian Northern is to be located. The new line crosses the Don road exactly four miles from Yonge street, and the station on the Scarborough-York town line will be six miles from Yonge street. The junction with the existing line of the C.N.R. is 7.60 miles from Yonge street. The Donlands station on the Canadian Pacific is 7.2 miles from the Union Station. The expropriations for the branch line north towards Donlands are on the Maclean estate, Milne and Watson farms.

No Change in C. P. R.
There is little or no change in the right of way of the Canadian Pacific, and over which the Canadian Northern will go, but it will be at least a double track—or perhaps four tracks over the West Don, and it will include three new bridges, which will all be at least double track, and the carry four tracks, namely, at the reservoir ravine, the belt line ravine and the West Don, and it is more than likely that all these bridges will have under decks for wagon and other wheel traffic.

PROVINCE CAUSED THE RISE IN VALUE

The Ontario Government does not make a very encouraging reply to the resolution of the board of trade, which asked that, in disposing of the normal school property, the city should be allowed to secure it at a reasonable cost. Sir James Whitney answered this argument to the effect that the municipality has not been the chief factor in the increased value of this property, but the entire province has been unquestionably the cause of the rise in value.

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS WAS LOST

Mix-Up Over Adoption by the City Council of the Board of Education Estimates Cost Taxpayers That Amount on Account of Increase in Labor and Materials.

Fifty thousand dollars of the rate-payers' money has been lost by the mix-up over the adoption by the city council of the board of education estimates.
"We could have gone on with a lot of the new work, but for the delay," said a prominent representative of the trustees, "and in consequence we shall have to pay 20 per cent. more. Materials have gone up, and the cost of labor has increased."
Satisfaction, however, was expressed at the finance committee meeting yesterday over the message from Mayor Hocken. It was announced by Chairman Brown, who said: "The mayor has promised that a bribe in accordance with the estimates will be passed at the next meeting of the city council. There was not time to get it prepared for this week's meeting. The money will then be paid as it is required."

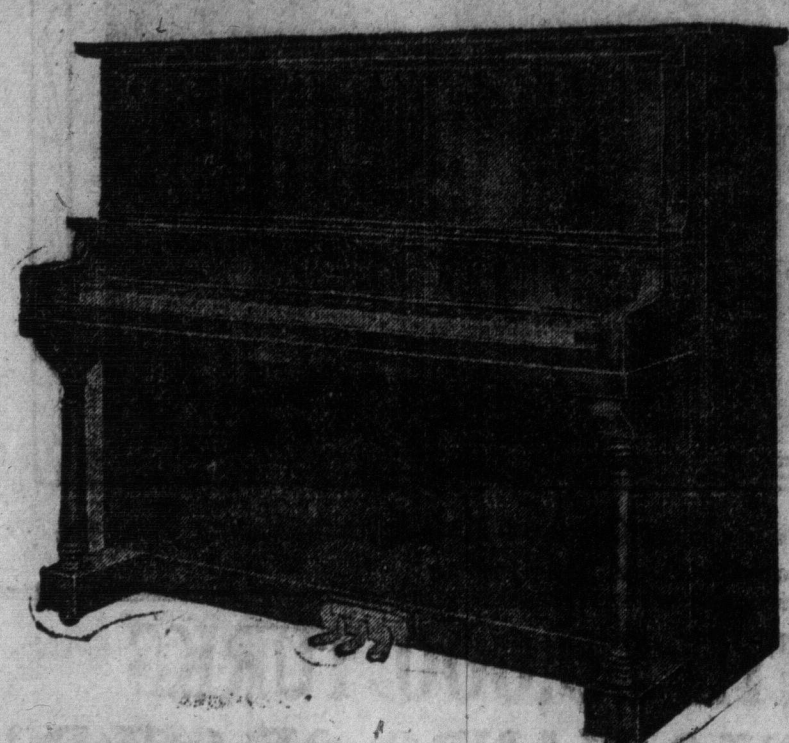
