The club started off with all that was necessary to make it a winner, and it now material was wanted, it would have been forthcoming, but every time that the press would make any statements about the club or what was needed Gibson hurried himself into print with a contrary idea. He being the manager, there was nothing more to be said.

And now the mob is down to the point where they can be smashed around just whenever their opponents feel inclined to apply the slush. For some matter, any cuckoo in the league could stand them on their heads. Simply because the batting order is all wrong, and when it does get to a place where it looks like a partial winner, the bench manager with the big league experience puts the crimp in it. A little speed, this afternoon would be appreciated, so let them go to it.

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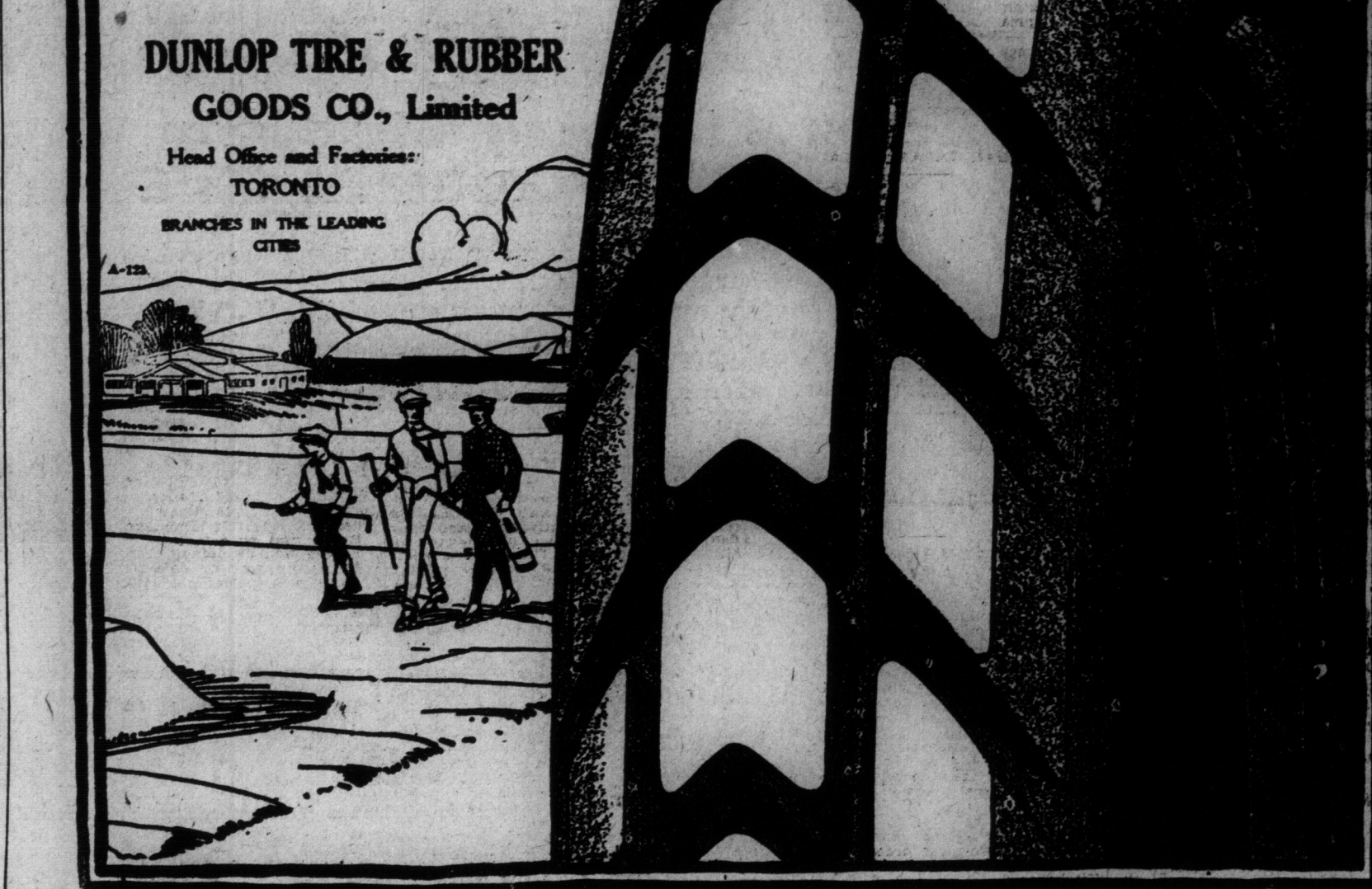

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BAN MUST APPEAR BEFORE THE REFEREE

New York, Aug. 13.—The New York American League club announced tonight it had obtained from State Supreme Court Justice Lydon an order compelling Ban Johnson, president of the league, to appear before a referee next Friday, and testify concerning the nature and extent of his alleged interests in the Cleveland club, in connection with his suspension of Carl W. May.

The New York club owners added they intended to question Mr. Johnson also concerning "the extent and nature of the Cleveland club's indebtedness to him," and "the circumstances of his controversy with Mr. Frazee of the Boston club."

The Tanke officials also announced an order had been served on Mr. Johnson, forcing him to appear in the supreme court next Friday morning to show reason why the temporary injunction issued to question Mr. Johnson should not be made permanent.
