

BATTLING THE GERMAN A GOOD IMPRESSION

Occupation of Rhineland Has Been a Blessing to the Germans.

Reuter Cable. Cologne, Germany, Sept. 14.—British forces on the Rhine are diminishing daily, and it is fair to say they will leave behind them an excellent impression. Isolated disturbances have occurred, but it would be wrong to form a general impression from these. A surprising feature indeed has been their ready view of the fact that we are occupying German territory, and that an intense feeling of disgust had been aroused among British soldiers by Germany's methods in waging war.

The people of the Rhineland feel that they are the victors of the war, because not only has British occupation brought with it relaxation of German officialdom, but has also meant increased prosperity. Signs of this are visible everywhere in the Rhineland. Cafes, shops, etc., are full, even exorbitant prices for many goods. British troops have parted freely with their money, and German tradesmen have not been slow to take advantage of this characteristic. "Tommy" has also left behind him the best of memories among the Germans. Particularly the German citizens will remember his many acts of spontaneous kindness, and the chivalry of his demeanor and conduct will be an indelible memory for the German people.

PROTEST ASSISTING ALIEN IMMIGRANTS

Meeting St. Catharines Veterans Against Bringing More Germans.

St. Catharines, Sept. 14.—A protest was formally voted by over 100 returned men in the Grand Opera House this afternoon against a statement by Sir George MacLaren Brown, that immigration from Germany would be favored, and the government will be memorialized to prevent immigration of alien enemies. A protest was also made against the discrimination made between the British reservist and the Canadian soldier or sailor in gratuity and pension allowances, and request made for the same gratuity and pensions for reservists and their dependents as to Canadians; also that the war gratuity be paid without regard to a man's former rank in the army.

STAGE IS ALL SET FOR TREATY DEBATE

First Trial of Strength is Expected Today in United States Senate.

Washington, Sept. 14.—Lines had been drawn by the opposing factions, request voted by the most part by returned to Washington and all was in readiness tonight for the opening tomorrow of the final stage in the peace treaty and league of nations controversy. The treaty with its league covenant, tentative plans provided, will be called up about 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon by Chairman Lodge of the foreign relations committee, and will be kept continuously before the senate in "open executive" sessions until the final vote on ratification is taken several weeks hence. Coincident with this plan, Republican North Dakota, who refused to join the relations committee, in the reporting of amendments, and who declined to approve the majority reservation to the league covenant, will file an individual report. Because of the enormous length of the document, the formal "first reading" will be dispensed with and the treaty, as set forth in the league covenant, will bring an early trial of strength, possible tomorrow, with the reading of article three of the league covenant, in which is defined the voting power of the various powers in the league council and assembly.

SERVICE IS RESUMED ON LORRAINE RAILWAYS

Metz, Sept. 14.—Service was resumed today on the railroads in Lorraine, after a strike which for several days had paralyzed the greater part of the railroad system. A settlement of the differences was effected on Friday night, and an official who had aroused the anger of the railroad workmen resigned his post.

EARLSCOURT GREAT SUCCESS

Seventeen Thousand People Attend—Plans for Bigger Improvements.

The fourth and last day of the Earlscourt second annual fall fair on Saturday proved to be the best of all. Royce Park bent crowded from noon to midnight with a crowd of happy, smiling people running into the thousands. The splendid weather, typical Indian summer, a hot sun and a tempered breeze, and the fact that Saturday being a half-day holiday all combined to swell the attendance from morning to night. It was a happy thought on the part of the directors to erect the arch that had done duty for the reception of the Prince of Wales to Earlscourt at the entrance to the fair grounds. This arch, decorated with the red, white and blue and illuminated at night with brilliant lights of the same colors, was one of the biggest entrance attractions to St. Clair avenue, as the street cars emptied their loads on the corner of Lansdowne avenue from all parts of the city.

New Army Citadel.

The G.W.V.A. tent, in charge of Serjt.-Major J. Stockley, containing a unique model of a doll's house, the pyrotechnic men, also attracted many visitors. The proceeds of this exhibit are to be given to the Earlscourt branch of the G.W.V.A. As the grounds were lighted for the last night, the evening entertainments, provided by the committee, became the feature, the biggest perhaps being the large marquee, in which Bert Lloyd and his party of comedians amused the public until a late hour. The Middle School was in charge of the musical arrangements in this tent.

Owners of concessions all report excellent business, and many of them are inquiring for stands in the 1920 fall fair. Earlscourt has come to the conclusion that it can handle big things when it goes out for it. There has not been a single discordant note heard through the entire four days. Mistakes, of course, have been made, but they have been quietly put right, and the 17,000 people that attended the fair this year will surely be exceeded in 1920.
