## IRON HAS ENTERED INTO SOUL OF OTTAWA CITY

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Has Taken Sides With G.T.R. and Sacrifices Beautiful Park.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—(Special).—The iron has entered into the soul of the capital to-night. The dearly loved premier has blossomed forth as a corporationist and has ranged himself alongside the magnates of the Grand Trunk Railway against the city.

It came about in this way. When Ottawa was born the most beautiful part of it, an immense rugged rock overlooking the Ottawa River was presented to the city by a public-spirited citizen and has since been known as Major's Hill Park. It is a delightful recreation on which the tired worker can view the landscape from a platform second only in Canada to the famous rock of Quebec. The Grand Trunk Railway has cast longing eyes on this spot, and with what argument it is easier to assume than to proclaim has enlisted the sympathy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Summoning all his eloquence he persuaded the city council that the Grand Trunk ought to have this site for a sumptuous hotel.

The council agreed amongst themselves that it would be a good thing to please the premier thus, but the pressure of public opinion was so overwhelmingly against it that the aldermen were forced to retract, and in conference with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, C. M. Hays, W. W. Wainwright and others to-day a civic deputation told the premier in plain terms that the will of the people was against this deprecation.

The Grand Trunk officials replied, "No Major's Hill Park, no hotel," and the premier acquiesced. He insisted that this site should be handed over to the railway corporation. The council is therefore in a quandary. The people are enraged, but dare they face the premier's anger? We shall see how council acts. The Laurier-Grand Trunk party within it is strong.

### ONE DAY TO CELEBRATE.

Veterans Want May 24th Officially Set Apart.

A deputation consisting of J. T. Hornibrook, president; Capt. George Henson, Walter H. Blight and Major A. Gillies, members of the executive council of the Veterans' Militia Association, waited upon Hon. Dr. Pyne at the education department yesterday morning and urged a change in the ordering of the ceremonies for the celebration of Empire Day. At present in this city and throughout the province the schoolchildren celebrate the day and decorate statues and monuments on the afternoon of the 23rd, while the veterans observe the day on the 24th. And the veterans desire that legislation be passed changing the day of celebration to the 24th, in common with other portions of the empire, and in order that a joint celebration may be made.

CITY IS AFTER TAXES FROM THE YORK LOAN

## Hamilton Happenings

### LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR HONORED AT HAMILTON

General News of the Ambitious City—Sir Frederick Borden's Promise.

HAMILTON, Oct. 22.—(Special).—The members of the Women's Worth Historical Society had an important and interesting ceremony this afternoon at the Stony Creek battlefield. They purchased five acres of this historic place some years ago, and have just succeeded in paying off the indebtedness. This afternoon the mortgage was handed to the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Mortimer Clark, who in turn handed it to the trustees, Hon. J. S. Hendrie, Col. J. M. Gibson and Thomas W. Watkins. The document was presented along with an address by Mrs. Calder, president of the society. His honor delivered a patriotic address, commending the ladies for what they had done.

Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia, was also present, and spoke. He promised to do all in his power to get a handsome grant through the house of commons for the erection of a monument on the battlefield. W. H. Wardrope, K.C., also spoke. His honor was received by a guard of honor from the 13th Regiment, under Captain Robertson. The ceremony took place in Old Gage Home, which was the quarters of the American officers before their defeat by Col. Harvey on June 5, 1813.

Mr. Barker was this morning committed to trial on the charge of committing an aggravated assault on Fred Jagard. He reserved his defence. Altho the plan for the Thanksgiving Day sham fight have not been given out yet, it is understood that it will take place near the western boundary of the city.

Sir Mortimer Clark, lieutenant-governor, paid his first official visit to Hamilton this morning. He was accompanied by his daughter and Sir Frederick and Lady Borden. At the station they were met by Mayor Stewart, Col. A. M. Gibson and some of the members of the finance committee. An address was presented to his honor by Mayor Stewart at the city hall, where a reception was given. Bouquets of yellow chrysanthemums, tied with the Tiger colors, yellow and black, were presented to Miss Clark and Lady Borden. The visitors were then taken on a tour of inspection to the International Harvester and Canadian Westinghouse plants, and for a drive about the city. They were entertained at luncheon by Col. J. M. and Mrs. Gibson.

Dr. Bell, provincial inspector, says that every precaution is being taken to stamp out the smallpox in Oakville. There are 27 cases, and they are being treated in tents, being attended by a physician and a staff of nurses. The town has appointed 24 constables to make the quarantine.

The relatives of Samuel Sutton, who was electrocuted by a live wire in Dundas, have started a suit for \$10,000 damages against the Cataract Power and Dundas Electrical Companies. Mrs. Moore, widow of the late Lyman Moore, died suddenly at an early hour this morning at her home, 39 Herkimer-street. She had been suffering from what was regarded as a mild attack of bronchitis. She was 68 years of age, and was a prominent member of the Centenary Methodist Church.

Col. Ingersoll of the Beach Park Company, waited upon the beach commissioners this morning, and hopes to get their permission for the building of the park. The commissioners have promised to give him a definite answer at once.
