**Paper Makers of the Old Country Anxious to Have an Export Duty Put On.**

**AND SHUT THE YANKEES OUT**

**Interesting Information Given by Mr. Macfarlane, President Canadian Paper Company.**

**CANADIAN SPRUCE IS THE BEST.**

**And Britishers Will Pay More for It Than for the Scandinavian Article.**

**Montreal, Sept. 3.**—(Special.)—Mr. John Macfarlane, president of the Canadian Paper Company, arrived back yesterday from England, where he states that the paper makers of the Old Country are most anxious that the Canadian Government should impose an export duty on pulpwood, and thus increase the cost of paper to the Americans and prevent the latter from making a slaughter market of London, Liverpool, Glasgow, Belfast and other ports having direct steam communication with the United States. He also reports that England is doing well with German goods, and says the belief entertained by the British legislators that patriotism would prevent Englishmen from buying goods stamped "Made in Germany" has a fallacy. The law, in fact, has had the contrary effect. For Britishers not only purchase these goods on account of their own patriotism, but the English traders flock over to Germany and purchase goods from the manufacturer. Mr. Macfarlane says that a delegation from the English paper makers will come over to Ottawa, where they will urge the Government to impose the export duty on pulpwood. He says Canada is now considered to be the great competitor in the British market for pulp wood with the Scandinavian countries, and all admit the superiority of the Canadian goods. Last year Canada exported over 100,000 tons of ground pulp to Britain and he declares that there is a sure market in England and on the Continent for the Canadian goods.

**DAWSON TO HAVE SCHOOLS.**

**Books Will Be Shipped From Winnipeg and Experienced Teachers Will Go There.**

**Winnipeg, Sept. 2.**—Dawson City now contains an estimated school population of between 300 and 400, but there are no school teachers or books in the district and the Government feel the necessity of providing them. The Public Schools Department has ordered that books be shipped from Winnipeg and that experienced teachers be sent to Dawson. An order for books has been placed through Mr. Daniel Macfarlane, Superintendent of Public Schools, and the books will be shipped on Algonquin.
