William Paterson when he called that gentleman's attention to these facts and raid: "He is in sympathy with protection, I know it. He is as proud of it as I am. such a manner as to leave no doubt of the determination of Canadians to adopt and maintain a fiscal policy adequately and firmly protective of the large na-tional interests at stake, also to carry out a national transportation policy.
