Aged Resident of Belleville Fatally Pounded Wife While Intoxicated.

Belleville, Nov. 2.-The jury in the Kleingbeil murder trial brought in a verdict about 3 o'clock this afternoon, finding the prisoner guilty of manslaughter. Judge Britton reserved sentence. The verdict is looked on as a just one

The court room was crowded this morning at 9 o'clock, when Mr. Justice Britton ddressed the jury. The prisoner came nto the court smiling, and wore on shis breast the medal won by him in the

His lordship began his address by explaining the law regarding homicide. He reviewed at length the evidence given by the various witnesses, and dwelt for some time upon the prisoner's repeated statements that he did it, and did it with his firsts. His lordship spoke for nearly an hour, and said the ground of insanity could not be considered, as no evidence was adduced to give them cause to believe the prisoner was insane. His charge was strongly against the prisoner.

The jury retired at 10 o'clock. Ferdinand Kleingbeil, a German, 71 years of age, and over half a century a resident of this country, was charged with the willful murder of his aged wife, between March 2 and 5 last.

The woman was found in a terrible state, from all appearances being literally pounded to death while the prisoner was n a drunken frenzy. Several witnesses testified to having

deed with his fists, and that he was willing to hang for it. Kleingbeil was a soldier in the Prussian war against Austria, and received the iron eagle as a reward.

Secret Code Thrown Overboard by Sailor Who Wished To Be Discharged.

London, Nov. 3.-The London Express says: According to reliable information received by the Express, the code signal book of the cruiser Vindictive, now at Sheerness, has been lost. The book contains the private signals of the Channel fleet, and its loss is not only a matter of profound importance to the navy, but to the Empire.

The sailor who had charge of the book under the supervision of an officer has been arrested, and so much importance is attached to the affair that the leave of both officers and crew has been entirely stopped since Saturday last. Divers are now at work searching for the missing book. It is understood that the man under arrest declares that he is tired of the service. and that he threw the book overboard when the midshipman was not looking, in order that he might be dismissed

from the navy. These secret signal books of the fleet contain information of the very highest value to any great power with which Great Britain might find herself at war. It is well known that they have a very great commercial value. and that the secret service agents of foreign Governments, who are always be found in the neghborhood of aval stations, will pay enormous sums

to obtain possession of one. In evidence given before a royal commission a few years ago, it was stated that France spent £100,000 a year on her secret service, and it is well known that Germany spends twice this sum annually, and Russia an almost equally

The signal books are guarded with the greatest care. At the close of each watch the officer of the watch must satisfy himself that the book is safe, and his relief's first duty is to verify this. During the watch the warrant officer is responsible to the lieutenant for its safe-keeping.


