A JUMP IN COST
OF MAINTENANCE

Hospital Expenditure for Supplies
Will Be 2½ Per Cent Greater
This Year Than Last.

The awarding of the contracts for
the supply of fish, liquors, drugs, gro-
ceries, bread, and meat for the com-
ing year at Victoria Hospital was the
chief business transacted at the regu-
lar meeting of the hospital trust held
yesterday afternoon in the mayor's
office at the city hall.

Contracts Awarded.

The contracts were awarded as fol-
lows: For the supply of fish, F. S. Onn;
for liquor, wine, etc., E. B. Smith; for
drugs, etc., W. T. Strong; for bread
supply, Parnell-Dean Company; for
groceries, A. McCormick & Sons; for
meat, George Jackson; milk, J. H.
Marshall.

Cost of Living.

It is estimated by the trust that it
will cost approximately 2½ per cent
more to run the hospital this year than
last, owing to the increase in the cost
of supplies.

The report of the official boiler in-
spector, Mr. George C. Robb was re-
ceived. It showed that the boilers at
the hospital are in good repair, with
the exception of one, in which the
plate around the handhole was corro-
ded badly. This plate, the inspector
thought should be fixed, at a cost of
\$5 or \$6.

"Jappyland."

A communication was received from
Mr. E. H. Coates, of Toronto, who sub-
mitted a proposition to the board, by
which he was to put on a play named
"Jappyland," a Japanese musical com-
edy, in this city, a portion of the pro-
ceeds from which would go toward
the furnishing of the new isolation
hospital. Mr. Coates' offer was ac-
cepted, on the condition that the ladies
who usually take charge of such af-
fairs were to have a say in the ar-
rangements.
