KING'S PLATE NAGS ARE LOOSENING UP

Britannia Goes Best Mile of Season in 1:49 3-5.

THORNCLIFFE STRING FAST

King Hamburg Flips Off Six Furlongs in 1:18 3-5—Some Moving.

TORONTO, April 30.—The Thorncliffe stable horses occupied the spotlight at

the Woodbine this morning. Britannia, King's Plate candidate, stepped the best mile of the season at the local course in 1:49 3-5 in rather handy style. Impress appears a little green, and was only asked three-quarters in 1:22 3-5. Although she has been named in the plate, she is unlikely to start.

King Hamburg, another member of the Thorncliffe string, went three-quarters in 1:18 3-5, the fastest move of the season at the distance. He is training better this spring since being gelded last fall. Graphic put in the same distance in 1:19 3-5. He was schooled for steepchasing last fall, and gives promise of developing into a good horse through the field.

The horses in Harry Giddings' string were given their first work this morning. The Gooderham plater, Captain B, went six-eighths in 1:06, and three-quarters in 1:22 1-5, in a manner that would indicate that this stable's horses have not been idle at the farm this spring. Opera Glass, the Irish horse, breezed three-quarters in 1:21 2-5. He is a nice looking chestnut colt.

Hub Hub and Waukeag, from the

stable of Capt. Press, which arrived here late on Saturday, were breezed one-quarter in 1:25.

Javota, under stout restraint, went a mile in 1:50, and Gartley, also from J. Whyte's stable, put in three-quarters in 1:22. Astrologer and Tar Brush went three-quarters in the same time. Hampton Dame's half was in 52 3-5.

Annie Edgar, one of the Irish fillies, in charge of Mr. West, went three-quarters in 1:29 2-5 very easily. She looks and acts like a smart 3-year-old. Bachelor's Blend, from the same stable, breezed five-eighths in 1:04 2-5.

The Beadmore platers, Ladder of Light and Alter Fire, stepped a smart one-half in 33 2-5 over a slow track yesterday. Smarty Cat's one-half was in 34. Fair Fox went in the same time.

Gordon went three-quarters in 1:24, his best move of the season. Leo Lembruck went three-eighths in .40.

GREAT INTEREST OVER KILBANE-WELSH FIGHT

NEW YORK, April 30.—Unusual interest is being shown by followers of boxing in the bout to be fought here tomorrow night between Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion, and Johnny Kilbane, holder of the featherweight title. The pugilists will meet for a bout of ten rounds.

Under the state rules no official decision can be rendered by the referee, who will be Charley White, a veteran arbiter of many noted championship matches. The winner is likely to be decided by the acclaim of spectators, based upon showing made during the contest.

Each man is considered one of the cleverest ring generals and glove artists in his respective class. Kilbane is credited with being the harder fighter but there is little, if any, betting on a knockout. Welsh will enter the ring with 135 pounds, which will give the lightweight champion an advantage of five or six pounds in weight over his opponent.
