

ALLIES TO COMPEL GERMANY TO CARRY OUT TERMS

NATIONAL DEBT OF BRITAIN IS REDUCED BY OVER HALF A BILLION DURING THE YEAR

J. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Declares Anglo-French Loan From U. S. Will Be Paid by Autumn—Proposed Increases in Taxation Outlined.

London, April 19.—J. Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, in introducing the budget in the House of Commons today, said the expenditures for 1920 were approximately £144,000,000 in excess of the budget estimate of last year, but £63,000,000 below the revised estimate of last October.

CITY HALL EMPLOYEE PUTS ON OVERALLS

A city hall employee, marching to work in overalls today, officials of the City Employees' Association, after getting a glimpse at him, promptly called a special meeting for 2 o'clock this afternoon, when it is intended to pledge all the members to wear overalls until the price of clothing drops. The lady employees will be requested to adorn themselves in Oliver aprons.

OVERALLS COST MORE

Toronto, April 19.—Although there is, so far, no recognized "Overall Club" in Toronto to protest against the price of clothing, the cost of overalls here has jumped from \$2 to \$2.50 for the cheapest variety. The employees of the city hall here are more in favor of an "overall league" than the "overall club" idea, so popular in the United States at present.

FAD HITS MONTREAL

Montreal, April 19.—With touches of spring weather prevailing here today the overall movement secured its first adherent. A prominent businessman was seen to walk through the streets in his office clad like a janitor, with a very dignified overcoat and cap to round off his overalls.

TURKISH RADICALS CONFER WITH LENINE

Washington, April 19.—By the Associated Press. Pasha and Djemal Pasha, co-conspirators with Mustafa Kemal in the Turkish revolution, arrived in Moscow today, and have been in conferences with Lenin, according to official advices received in Washington.

The conference was said to have been for the purpose of organizing concerted revolutionary movements in Turkey, India, Egypt, Persia and elsewhere, and Muslim delegates from India, Persia, Azerbaijan, Afghanistan and Egypt were said also to have participated in a recent conference with Lenin in Moscow.

MAN WHO MURDERED NEW YORKER SAYS HE LIVED IN THIS CITY

Thomas W. Simpkins Declares He Worked At Printing Trade.

JOINED ARMY HERE
Former Soldier in Canadian Forces To Be Examined As To Sanity.

New York, April 19.—Thomas W. Simpkins, formerly of Calgary, Alta., where he was known as Thomas W. Simpkins, faced arraignment in Yorkville court today for shooting Dr. James Wright Markoe, an eminent surgeon, in fashionable St. George's Episcopal Church yesterday. Police officials said they would later ask for the appointment of a commission to examine Simpkins as to his sanity. He told the police he had escaped from a lunatic asylum last week.

The prisoner's ramblings indicated that he had a mania for hearing sermons. He told of listening with pleasure to a Paulist priest in New York a year ago, and of having an argument with a minister in Gary.

"The minister called a constable and had me arrested," he said. "When I got out I decided to get a revolver. I got out I heard the minister say: 'Some people seem to ignore others, and don't treat them kindly.'"

Then, the prisoner told detectives, he was seized by an impulse to shoot. At another time in his ramblings he said: "Since I came out of the asylum I have carried a revolver to make sure I'd never be put in the asylum again."

He added that he had resolved to shoot the first person who tried to arrest him.

In another rambling statement to detectives, Simpkins gave a slightly different version of his experiences in Canada.

"I don't know what I did in London," he said, "but I remember I sailed for Canada just after the Titanic was sunk, in April, 1912. I worked as a printer in Montreal and London, Ontario, and then I came to New York."

When I thought of my wife I nearly killed myself for over a year. I came to prepare for overseas, and I ordered me on a troop train for Hall, N. J. I joined the Canadian Fusiliers, and my wife was in Duluth, and was about to give birth to a third child, and I just jumped from that train and managed to work my way to this city.

"They didn't get me, because I used Continued on Page Four.

UNIONISTS AND SINN FEINERS FIGHT IN LONDON DERRY STREET, POLICE CLUB BOTH PARTIES

Beifast, April 19.—There was renewed rioting in Londonderry Saturday evening between Unionists and Sinn Feiners, the police clubbing both impartially. Revolvers were used freely. A youth named Mathew De Ehan was shot in the lung and lies in a critical condition. The fighting was so fierce at Carlisle Bridge that pedestrians were unable to return to their homes, and were stranded at night.

73,114 HOMELESS IN GOTHAM; THOUSANDS OF FAMILIES TO LIVE IN TENTS THIS SUMMER

New York, April 19.—Thousands of New York families, some of the 73,114 registered as "homeless" by the tenement house department, are expected to live in tents furnished by the United States army until the present housing shortage is remedied, according to men interested in the building trade here.

Just where they will locate their new dwellings has not yet been decided. Some of the homeless are expected to be housed in the city's vacant lots, while others will be housed in tents erected on the city's vacant lots.

RAILWAY TRAFFIC IS BECOMING NORMAL AS STRIKERS COME BACK

New York, April 19.—Striking railroad employees continued to flock back to work in New York and vicinity today despite efforts of radicals, and railroad officials asserted conditions were approaching normal.

At the office of the British consular general this morning it was stated that many Canadian citizens apparently are not aware that passports should be secured at the travelers' place of residence. Canadians bound for Europe, who leave Canada without a passport, can only be given emergency certificates good for a single voyage. Another regulation of which many Canadian travelers appear to be unaware, it was said, is that all passengers must secure an income tax receipt from the United States customs house. Canadians are not excepted from this regulation. They must visit the customs house and secure a clearance paper showing they are not liable to taxation in the United States.

Recently a great many Canadian soldiers bound for the old country have been arriving in New York from Canadian points under the impression that their discharge certificate would be accepted in lieu of a passport. As the discharge certificate carries no photograph of the bearer it is not a valid passport. Canadian ex-soldiers must secure passports before starting from Canada, it was stated, as under the regulations it is impossible for them to travel on discharge certificates.

SHIPS ARE READY, BUT DELAY START

Cleveland, April 19.—Most of the freighters are ready for sailing orders and while Lake Michigan travelers could put out this week, indications are that a general start will not be made until late in the month. It will take the railroads weeks to get back to normal after the strikers return to work, and with a shortage of coal in all lines and many of the steel plants shut down on that account, lake coal will be very slow coming forward.

There is a big fleet at the lower end of the route and boats at Lake Erie ports will have trouble getting fuel during the next two weeks. Few cargoes will be loaded, since stocks are very low at upper lake ports and coal is in low demand. Many furnaces are idle and with shipments from the docks shut off, stocks of ore at Lake Erie ports and furnace yards will be much heavier at the opening than was calculated.

Poet Dictator's Bald Head Sets Officers' Style

Fiume, April 19.—Gabriele d'Annunzio's bald head has set the fashion for the officers of his little army, many of whom have shaved their craniums and are endeavoring to grow miniature Van-dyke beards as copies of the poet's chin adornment.

The Fiume aviators have adopted the craze with greater zeal than other branches and call themselves "Iron Heads." Youthful officers in their teens and early twenties have shaved their heads and are wearing little pointed beards in an effort to look as much like the poet as they can.

Mixed uniforms of French horizontal-bar and Italian grey-green are worn by d'Annunzio's men with great pride.

SEVERAL KILLED WHEN STORMS SWEEP SOUTH

Little Rock, Ark., April 19.—A score of persons were killed and many injured in storms which swept several counties in Northwest Arkansas, last night, according to meagre messages received today over demoralized wire service.

LETTS SUBMITS PEACE TERMS TO BOLSHIEVIKI

The Complete Independence of Letvia Is Principal Demand.

RE-ESTABLISH FRONTIER
Restitution of Property Seized by the Reds Also Asked.

Moscow, April 19.—By the Associated Press.—Chairman Seberg of the Letvian delegation has laid down the fundamentals, which, he said, Letvia considered should serve as the basis of the negotiations with Soviet Russia. He mentioned eight points, the first of which was recognition of the complete independence of Letvia and the establishment of a frontier in accordance with natural boundaries. The other points were:

Second—Mutual renunciation of claims for the payment of the costs of the war.

Third—Mutual renunciation of interference in internal affairs of one nation by the other.

Fourth—Protection of the rights of Letvian nationals in Russia and recognition of the repatriation rights.

Fifth—Restitution of property and securities removed by Russia.

Sixth—The participation of Russia in compensation to Letvia for losses sustained in the Russo-German and Russo-Letvian wars.

Seventh—Recognition of the proportionate claim of Letvia to the Imperial Russian Government's holdings and gold funds.

Eighth—The use of Letvian harbors by Russia in return for equivalent compensation.

For the Russian Government, Adolph Joffe, head of the soviet delegation, insisted that ethnographic considerations alone should determine the boundary lines between the two countries, and that the question of property rights in Russia by Letvians and the repatriation of Letvian nationals must be considered in the light of Russian laws.

As to the use of Letvian harbors, M. Joffe declared it was a right possessed by Russia, and that the question of compensation for such use was a matter as free transit would be more beneficial to Letvia than to Russia.

POINCARE URGES DELEGATES TO SAN REMO NOT TO THINK OF REVISING PEACE TREATY

Former French Premier Upholds Action of His Government in Advancing Into Germany When Terms Were Violated—Declares Germany Is Making a Practice of Breaking Faith.

Paris, April 19.—Demands that the Allies, during the San Remo meeting this week resist all attempts to revise the terms of the Versailles treaty with Germany are made by Raymond Poincare, former president of the French Republic, in an article published by the Matin. France and Belgium have been "deprived of guarantees" by the failure of Great Britain and the United States to put the tripartite convention into operation, he says, and the League of Nations is as yet without means of action.

Premier Millerand is congratulated by M. Poincare for the wisdom he showed in pursuing a "wise policy in view of the necessity of stopping the fatal movement leading the Allies to the precipice," and it is declared the allied governments should support France against Germany. The former president asserts Germany is "violating the Versailles treaty and avoiding all engagements, and that France and Belgium could not have done otherwise than advance east of the Rhine when German regulars invaded the neutral zone in the Ruhr Valley."

GERMANY WILL AGAIN BE TOLD SHE MUST OBEY TREATY TERMS

San Remo, April 19.—(Associated Press).—The inter-allied supreme council began its formal sessions here today. The meeting was opened punctually at the hour set, 11 a.m., in the Villa de Vachau, on the hills to the northwest of the main town.

Fifth—The Turkish question was on the program for first consideration by the conference today, it developing that there already has been discussion over the question of enforcing the execution of the treaty of peace with Germany. The premier, however, have not yet agreed upon the form of pressure to be used should Germany continue negotiations. Premier Lloyd George, Millerand and Nitti, after their meeting with former Minister Sclavova of Italy, Philippe Berthelot, political director of the French foreign office, and numerous secretaries, yesterday at the villa de Vachau, met again in the afternoon at Premier's hotel. No outsiders were present with the exception of three interpreters.

They were agreed without a moment's discussion that Germany should be told in the most positive manner that she must observe the treaty. Premier Lloyd George suggested economic pressure, depriving Germany of food, raw materials and intercourse with the Allied countries. Premier Millerand is described as having said that such pressure, without the use of naval or military aid, would in effect, be no pressure at all. He declared it would be another "Ludlow" and that Germany could conduct her economic business through the neutral countries just the same. The only warning that would be respected, the only pressure that would be effective, he asserted, would be force—the application of such force as the military and naval advisers might deem sufficient.

Premier Lloyd George, it is said, resisted this conclusion. Premier Nitti inclined towards the British prime minister's view, and the matter rests there for the present. A compromise may be reached, however, with the threat of applying effective compulsion without indicating what form the compulsion might take.

FRANCE WILL MAINTAIN AN ARMY OF 700,000 MEN UNTIL TERMS OF PEACE TREATIES ARE FULFILLED

Government Officials Contemplate Keeping 350,000 Conscripts Under Training At All Times—Soldiers Will Be Paid Same Wages They Would Secure in Industrial Pursuits.

Paris, April 19.—France must maintain an army of 700,000 men until enemy countries "show their goodwill by executing the terms of their treaties," is the opinion of Government officials, according to newspapers here. Plans under contemplation call for 350,000 conscripts constantly under training, eighteen months' service being required for each man.

Wages equal to these paid industrial workers, less the cost of food and lodging, provided by the Government, will be paid enlisted men and conscripts who re-enlist. It is expected bills to carry out this program will be introduced in the Chamber some time in June.

Rules relative to the length of hair, mustache and beard, which, since early in the war were very strict, have relaxed. In future a soldier may cut his beard in any way his fancy may direct. Old regulations permitted beards, but specified they must not be so luxuriant as to hide collar insignia.

ATLANTA CITIZENS AS STATE NOT TO RECOGNIZE DE VALERA

Atlanta, Ga., April 19.—Over 2,000 people yesterday unanimously carried resolutions urging Gov. Dorsey and Mayor Keefe to refuse any official recognition of the Irish republic, when he visits this city this week.

FRENCH DEPUTY SUGGESTS NOVEL SCHEME TO WIPE OUT COUNTRY'S DEFICIT

Paris, April 19.—Proposals to initiate a novel scheme of taxation to wipe out the treasury deficit have been brought forward in the Chamber of Deputies by Paul Aubriot, a member of the group of Socialists which was read out of the party because it supported war measures during the world conflict. He urges that the total deficit be decided by the number of taxpayers, thus establishing a unit of taxation, and that each unit then be assessed on a sliding scale based upon the taxpayers' income.

CHILD FINDS PILLS, SWALLOWS SOME, DIES IN HOSPITAL

St. Catharines, April 19.—Clara Grace, 1-year-old daughter of W. H. Hannan, obtained some pills while sitting in a chair at a table today and swallowed two or three. In ten minutes she became violently ill, and died shortly after being rushed to the General and Marine Hospital. Dr. Curry states the symptoms resemble those of strychnine poisoning.

CONDITIONS IN SEA OF MARMORA ISLANDS ARE GROWING WORSE

Belgrade, April 19.—Sanitary conditions in the Balkan region are daily assuming more serious aspects. Reports received here from Constantinople state that stations there and in the islands of the Sea of Marmora are filled with people who have been exposed to typhus infection.

One refugee, who recently arrived here was Danilo Tomazovitch, 15 years old, who walked more than 1,000 miles to get out of Russia, where his parents both died of typhus.

\$12,000,000 IN FURS ARE ON SALE IN NEW YORK

New York, April 19.—Raw furs, valued at \$12,000,000, comprising the largest and most valuable collection to be offered in this city, were placed on sale today. The sale will continue for eight days. In ten minutes after the sale began, more than 61 tons of Australian and New Zealand rabbit skins were offered for sale.
