It may be added that the principle of crediting interest on paid-up capital before allotting the insurance profits (which principle has been followed in the past by British and Canadian companies generally) has been inserted in the new General Insurance Act recent-

ly introduced into parliament, as applicable for the future to all Canadian stock companies.

MUST ALL PAY \$400

License Commissioners Will Not Allow Extension at Old Rate.

Spoken to last night regarding the attitude of the license commissioners as to what fee the hotelkeepers who were outside the city last year, but

who are now in and have been cut off should pay for their three months' grace in selling their stocks. Chairman Coatsworth said that the board acted and would proceed on the understanding that \$400 would be charged everybody.

Three hotels in East Toronto paid \$250 for their licenses. They were under the impression that they should only \$62.50 for three months. The Deer Park Hotel paid \$120 for its license and thought it would get three months for \$70.

Besides the license commissioners, Eudo Saunders, provincial inspector, declared yesterday: "It is quite clear they must all pay the new fee or quit business."

John Gorman of the Golden City Hotel, Bay and Adelaide-streets, says he'll close up rather than pay the \$400, while E. Karmann, the Empire Hotel, Main

is not certain but that the expense of keeping hotel for three months was not too much to make it worth while. Mr. Kormann suggests that the city council should refuse to accept their 50 per cent. of the extension fee, and then possibly the government would do the same, as a compensatory measure.

It is estimated that \$1,000,000 private loss has been entailed by the reduction, as follows: Forty-one hotelkeepers, \$825,000; Breweries, \$250,000; former breweries, \$175,000. The breweries lose

as follows: Corgrave, O'Keefe, Reinhardt, Dominion and Copland, \$45,000 each, and Korman and G. J. Fry, wholesalers, \$12,500 each. This is in interests they held in houses that were unlucky.

Ordered to Vacate.

A sheriff's nole was served yesterday on Nelson Brothers, proprietors of the Rossin House, to vacate. This was done at the instance of J. H. Chewatt, an heir of the Chewatt estate and owner of the hotel building.
