BOY SCOUTS.

There is an immense amount of mis apprehension in some quarters as to the true spirit of the boy scout movement. It is probable that Sir Robert S. S. Baden Powell will have something to say upon this matter before he leaves us, as he did so lucidly in Vancouver. But whether he does or not, the parents of the city should make themselves familiar with the objects and methods of the movement. If they do so they will not need to be urged to have their boys enlist in it. Soldiering is the least important and almost the last thing considered for the scouts. When you have a firstclass man you have a first-class soldier. That is the philosophy of the matter. So the aim is to develop firstclass men.

"We discountenance military drill," says Sir Robert, "because that makes boy part of a machine, whereas we want to develop the individuality. . We teach him ambulance work and salling, anything but military drill, which destroys the individual." In England, he stated, they suffered exceedingly from what he called "blind alley" occupations for boys, among which he included the newsboys and the vanboys, occupations which boys take up because they bring




