THE EMPRESS OF IRELAND ARRIVES AT ST. JOHN TODAY

Will Land the China Mails at This Port—A Record Trip—Description of the Great C. P. R. Ocean Liner—Everything Ready to Rush the Mails and Cabin Passengers Westward—What the Officials of the Railway Say.

The Empress of Ireland, the first of the splendid new C. P. R. liners to come to this port this season, has arrived outside of Partridge Island, and is expected to dock at Sand Point about 3.30 or 4 o'clock.

At 11 o'clock this morning the Empress was caught from the Island by the Marconi wireless telegraph station. She was then about 30 miles from the Island, and was running full speed for the port.

C. P. R. Steamship Empress of Ireland

The Empress of Ireland is one of the two big liners built for the C. P. R. last year. In the run from Liverpool to Quebec she had a sister ship broke all records for the route.

A Splendid Ship

The Empress of Ireland and The Empress of Britain were built to the order of the C. P. R. by the Fairfield Shipbuilding and Engineering Company's works in Glasgow and made their first voyage on the 26th of September.

INSURANCE COMMISSION NO OPIUM IN TEN YEARS

MANY CHANGES Hears Views of the Policy Holders Association

Would Have Department of State Insurance and Greater Publicity—There is a Place for Fraternal Societies to Provide Cheap Insurance to Patrons.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 23.—(Special).—At the Insurance Commission this forenoon, Mr. Shepley put in the memorial of the Policy Holders' Association as an exhibit. It set forth the views of the Association on a variety of subjects. It held that no notes should be accepted as payment of policies; no policy should be issued until a first premium was paid in cash; all mortgages and debentures should be deposited with the superintendent of insurance; all investments should be in the name of the company; policy holders should have a representative on every board; proceeds should not be allowed for policy holders, or share holders; companies should not be allowed to use estimates, unless first approved by the superintendent of insurance; a department of state insurance should be established; reports should be published in the press as well as in the government blue books; any contract providing a bonus for future business should be declared illegal; all salaries for officers should be fixed by the directors.

THE L. C. R. MAILED

MONCTON, Nov. 23.—(Special).—The L. C. R. with the English mails passed through Moncton at 4.45 this morning, having made the run to Moncton in three hours and 38 minutes. She left here at 4.46 and arrived at Campbellton at 9.38. At the present rate she will average fifty miles an hour, including all stops, making the run from Halifax to Moncton in twenty hours, or two hours less than the last trip.
